Farm Improvements Scheme,

SEASON 1946/47. THE Minister for Agriculture is prepared to consider applications for grants under this scheme in respect of farm improvement works approved by him on or after 1st April, 1946, for completion within such period, prior to 31st March, 1947, as may be fixed by him in each

Applications will be dealt with in the order of their receipt up to the limits of the money available. The scheme applies to all holdings devoted solely or mainly to agricuiure, but preference will be given to applicants who earn their living solely or mainly by farming. Grants will be payable for approved works of the following kinds:—

(a) land reclamation and field drainage : (b) construction or improvement of watercourses; (c) construction or improvement

Mr. L. Veale, vice-chairman, presided at the meeting of the Dungarvan U.D.C., on last Friday. Also present —Messrs. T. Kyne, N. Kelly. M. Morrissey, T.D.; M. O'Meara, Acting Clerk.

SCAVENGER'S DUTIES. Relative to remarks made at the last meeting regarding the duties of the scavenger, Mr. J. Ormonde, Act-ing Borough Surveyor, stated—"I am not satisfied that this man's duties are too onerous except from the point of view that perhaps he is too old for the work. I also believe that he does not display proper co-operation with the men provided him as helpers. The helper's duty is to sweep refuse on the street ahead of the scavenger and to help him in loading this and also the refuse bins along the journey. This is done four times a week for Dungarvan and twice for Abbeyside. I am informed that on many occasions the scavenger has changed his route from the regular one, with the result that heaps of refuse have been left overnight in parts of the town. There is absolutely no reason

or justification for this. "For some time past numerous complaints have been made about this man. He has repeatedly refused to remove refuse bins from a particular area in Abbeyside, although he passes this area to collect refuse. It has also been reported to me recently that he has dumped some loads of street refuse in certain private lands, although expressly ordered that this must be carted to the marsh as manure for the council's allot-

"I believe any supposed grievances that this man may have are of his own making. With proper co-operation between the scavenger and helpers, work can easily be done.' Regarding the complaint about the scavenging of the streets in Loughmore, Mr. Ormonde stated that these received the attention comparable with other parts of the town, but did not seem to retain the benefits.

The Acting Clerk stated that the Manager's order was that a copy of the report be sent to the scavenger and that he be informed that unless he carries out his duties in accordance with the overseer's directions. ance with the overseer's directions




