## Belgian Trawler Damaged.

A mine which became entangled in the trawl of the Belgian trawler, St. Jan Berchmans (140 tons) of Oostende, while fishing off Mine Head, late last Saturday night, exploded as the net was being hauled aboard and injured one of the crew. The boat was damaged and is at present berthed at Dungarvan Quay.

The crew had begun to draw at about 9 o'clock when it was noticed that the net had fouled. It was hauled aboard again and was almost in when the explosion occurred near the side of the boat. The vessel shook violently and all the lights went out. The engine room began to fill while the captain headed her for Dungarvan harbour, where she was beached on a sand-bar.

Later the Helvick Lifesaver arrived on the scene and after considerable difficulty towed the vessel to a less precarious part of the bar. The injured member of the crew was then taken ashore and removed to Dungarvan hospital.

On Monday morning the life-boat towed the vessel into Dungarvan Quay where she now lies safely beached. Shortly after the vessel had berthed the Co. fire-engine and trolley arrived on the quay and pumped out the water in the engine room.

It is thought that some of the seams in the bottom plates of the vessel were burst open by the explosion.
