Waterford Committee of Agriculture.

Mr. P. R. Power, Chairman, presided at the monthly meeting of the Waterford County Committee of Agriculture at the Courthouse, Dungarvan, on last Saturday. Also present: Messrs. M. O'Ryan, V.C.; M. F. Walsh, W. Morris, H. Hart, D. Heskin, T.D.; W. Dowden, James Mansard, T. Fives, P. J. O'Shea, Instructor in Agriculture; Michael O'Sullivan, assistant dog; and D. Hurley, Acting Secretary.

MEMBERS DEBARRED FROM GRANTS.

The Acting Secretary said that at the last meeting they had deferred consideration of the schemes in case there might be any alteration in the scheme. Mr. Hart referred to the suggestion that the members should not be debarred from the scheme and said that members should be allowed to avail of all schemes.

Mr. Walsh—I should be open to everybody. Mr. O'Ryan said that only members of the Committee were debarred. That was unjust. There was a number of farmers living in exposed areas get shelter belts at one-fifth of the cost was also passed.

A letter from the Department called attention to the importance of increased small production. Replying to Mr. Norris, the Acting Secretary said that there were very few silos erected. The bulk of them were erected in 1930 and some were rarely used.

SHELTER BELTS FOR EXPOSED AREAS.

Mr. O'Ryan said that everybody knew what the mountain farmer had to contend with, in exposed and desolate areas with no shelter for their cattle. He thought that such farmers should get special facilities as regards shelter belts and lime. They had not the facilities of the lowland farmers, and the least they should get were special subsidies for lime and shelter belts.

The Chairman said suppose they got four-fifths from the Committee and paid one-fifth themselves it would be an improvement. Mr. O'Ryan—You could bring it up before the next Executive Council meeting.

CATTLE PRODUCTION.

Mr. O'Ryan said that generally speaking, licensed bulls had not improved the quality of milk cattle. Chairman—I'd say there has been a decided improvement. Mr. Hart—As regards milk and butter production, the object in view has not been attained at all. Chairman—There is every chance that cattle are going to be better.

Mr. O'Ryan said that the whole trouble was the cost of production was too high, that the small farmers were at the mercy of the rancher, and they should organize and come together. The position was that the small man must sell and the other man need not because he had grass for the cattle all the year round. He contended that the solution was to rear less and get better prices.

Mr. Hughes said that the dangerous tendency was to overstock. The man who did not produce budgeted for his haggard, etc.; but the other man did not budget, and consequently had no reserve. Mr. Norris—If the cost of production were brought down, it would be the best remedy for him.

Mr. Heskin said another danger was the controlled price. How many of the small producers get more than the controlled price. They were not in a position to hold their grain. Mr. O'Ryan—I'm not different with you.

Mr. Dower—We all agree with you. Mr. O'Ryan. But the difficulty is to find a remedy. Mr. Hart—Reduce the cost of production; that is the remedy. Mr. Heskin said that an appeal should be made to people not to produce over and above what they are not able to cater for. Mr. Hart said he would propose

Murphy, Secretary, Cork Board, wrote enclosing a letter from the National Graves' Association, East Waterford Branch, protesting against the holding of the Tipperary-Cork match at Waterford on Easter Sunday, as this was the day on which a memorial was being unveiled at Richardstown in honour of the East Waterford I.R.A. men who fell during 1916 to 1923.

The Chairman said that they did know about this matter as it was made by the Waterford Branch Field Committee. He asked the secretary report to the Tipperary and Cork Board and explain the position. It was unanimously agreed that this date be closed on in the East Waterford.

LISMORE CASTLE Kilmacthomas Court.

Lismore is beautifully situated on the steep southern bank of the Blackwater, overlooking the picturesque valley through which this noble river runs and which here is particularly beautiful. Three Months for Army Deserter.—A sentence of three months' imprisonment, with hard labour, was served in the Military Detention Camp at Collins Barracks, Cork, was imposed on Michael Fitzgerald (alias Power), of Kilmac, who was charged, as alleged, with breaking and entering the lock-up premises of one, Edward Hill, of the Lock-up at Main-Street, Kilmac, and stealing therefrom goods to the value of 15s. 2d.

Defendant, who was not represented (by a solicitor), having submitted to the Court's jurisdiction, pleaded guilty.

Inspir. P. McGonagle, O.S. Waterford deputising for Supt. J. Doyle, G.S. Fermoy, was prosecuted, outlining the case, told the Justice that the premises in question were entered in the early hours of the morning (precisely 12.30 a.m.) by the defendant gaining entry through a window, and stole cigarettes, razor blades, and shoe laces from the shop, to the total value of 15s. 2d.

In addition, defendant caused a lot of damage to a wain register in the premises using a boom knife to unscrew the screws. The register contained 33s, but the defendant did not succeed in getting it open. This, said the Inspector, was a very daring burglary. He entered the premises by a front window directly opposite another house and managed to make some considerable time to take an entry. Defendant got a candle and made sure he had taken an hour, or more, to try and unscrew the cash register. The goods were later found on defendant by Sgt. Heraty and Garda Hamilton, G.S. Kilmac.

In answer to the Justice, witness said that defendant was bound over for two years at Waterford District Court, in September last, when he pleaded guilty to the larceny of 15s. the property of Stephen Butler, Dungarvan.

Defendant, said Inspector McGonagle, was a deserter from his unit, as Fermoy Military Barracks, and there was an Army officer present who would ask permission to take him over in the event of a conviction and sentence.

Defendant, in evidence, pleaded that he was hungry on the occasion and broke into the shop and took two loaves of bread.

The Army officer asked the Court that defendant be handed over to military custody in the event of a conviction and sentence.

The Justice asked the District Justice to take into account now the previous charge against the defendant, and remarked that with regard to defendant's present plea that he was hungry, he (defendant) had 2s. of his own in his possession at the time, he committed the offence.

The Justice sentenced defendant as stated above.

The defendant, on hearing the sentence, told the Justice that he was over 180 days absent from his unit, and could not be taken back to an Army prison.

The Army officer stated that he (defendant) was not over 180 days absent.

The Justice reaffirmed the sentence of three months' hard labour at the Military Detention Camp, Collins Barracks, Cork.

In the meantime the patient's wife walked up to where the patient was sitting, which was only about 150 yards from the County Board gate, and on her suggestion the patient got into a donkey cart, which was passing at the time, and was admitted at 2.20 p.m. without a ticket. This, however, was received shortly after.

The patient was not confined until 3 o'clock the following morning. It is scarcely necessary for me to say that had the ambulance driver been on the premises when the call came the ambulance would have been sent for the patient at once. This is invariably done in accident or emergency cases.
