

How three members of the Detective Branch of the Garda in Cork spent over 50 hours investigating a bogus allegation of robbery made by a 72-year-old Tallow man, was related at the Cork District Court last week, before Mr. D. B. Sullivan, B.L. Timothy Hennessy, alias Michael Limerick Celebrant Rey, Father

Sergt. P. J. Lyons, G.S. Tallow, proved a statement volunteered by the accused. In this the accused stated he was 711 years of age, nag a wife and no family. He had for years been purchasing timber for timber merchants and came to Duntimber merchants, and came to Dunlattle to inspect some timber, going
later to Cork. Failing to get accommodation anywhere else, he went to
the Salvation Army Hostel, and got
a bed in a room where there were six
or seven other men. He had £57 in
notes in an envelope, and put this
with his watch and chain under his
pillow. During the night the statement went on, he saw two men approaching his bed, both wearing black
masks, one with a recolver, and the
other with a light. They took the
money and the watch from under his
pillow, made him get up, brought him
out on the street at 5 a.m., and having warned him not to report the robing warned him not to report the rob-

ing warned him not to report the robbery, left him.

In a further statement, the accused said he was not in Cork during the month of Cotober, and had never comblained to anyone about money being stolen from him by women in a public-house in Cork. The reason he hadn't reported the Salvation Army Hostel robbery was because it would not be trusted by those for whom he bought timber.


