RING DEFEAT BRICKEY RANGERS

Ring, 0-5; Brickey Rangers, 0-2.
A very poor exhibition, was the unanimous verdict of the spectators who saw Ring defeat Brickey Rangers by 5 points to 2 in the first round of the Waterford junior football championship at Dungarvan on last Sunday. They were, for the most part, running around in aimless confusion, accomplishing nothing. COUNTY WATERFORD COMMITTEE OF AGRICULTURE

Mr. P. R. Power (Chairman) presided at the monthly meeting of the Waterford County Committee of Agriculture at the Courthouse, Dungarvan, on Friday of last week. Also present: Messrs. M. McGrath, M. F. Walsh, M. Harty, D. Heskin, T. D. W. Norris, J. Quirk, T. Morrissey, D. Harley (Acting Secretary), P. O'Shea (instructor in horticulture), and Miss M. M. Mullins (instructor in poultry-keeping).

POTATO SPRAYERS.
The Acting Secretary said they might remember that last September one of the alterations in the regulations in respect of the financial year 1946/47 was the increase in respect of horse-drawn potato sprayers allocation from £80 to £100. The Department had agreed to that.
Replying to a member, the Acting Secretary said five had been allocated last year, and five could be allocated this year.

Mr. T. Morrissey asked was that sufficient for the county. The position was that there was not any in his area.
Messrs. McGrath, Harty, Walsh, and the Chairman said that there were none in their respective areas either.
Acting Secretary—There are nine applicants for five machines this year.
The Acting Secretary then read the names of the applicants following which Mr. Morrissey said there were none in the West at all. It was not fair to have it confined to the Kilmacomas and Bonmahon areas.
Mr. Walsh—There is no one in the Lismore area either.

The Acting Secretary pointed out that the inviting of applications for machines had not been advertised. A suggestion was made at the last meeting to have a list of applications for sprayers. He was not in a position to do that until he got this letter from the Department agreeing to the allocation.
The Chairman said he had been speaking to an official of Messrs. Pierce, and he told him that there was a large number of orders in for sprayers, and they could give no guarantee that they could supply them.
It was agreed to grant the applications of Messrs. W. Keating, Kilrossanty area; W. Power, Sallidway area; T. Hackett, Knocknagarea, and to leave two over for the Lismore electric sprayers.

ORCHARD SPRAYERS.
Mr. Quirk raised the question of orchard sprayers, and contended that high-power sprayers were not suitable for his district at all. He was of opinion that smaller sprayers would be better.
In the connection an application was made for a high-power sprayer from Stella Mansfield, Ballyduff.
The Acting Secretary pointed out that the allocation for the coming year for fruit sprayers was only £50. It was stated that a sprayer had recently been sold at a public auction and purchased by a person outside the area.
Mr. D. Heskin, T.D. said that the Committee provided money for the sprayers for the benefit of the public, and it was not fair that any man should come along and purchase one for his own use.
The Acting Secretary pointed out that the Committee paid half the cost—about £24.
Mr. Heskin—A condition should be laid down that the sprayers be kept all the time by the man who gets them.
Mr. Quirk suggested that they get six or seven small sprayers instead of one high-power machine.
Mr. Heskin agreed and said it would be more practicable to have them in small areas.
Chairman—A high-power sprayer would, I think, be more economical in an area like Dungarvan.
Mr. P. O'Shea said that one sprayer in a district would be capable of looking after 30 acres.
Mr. Heskin asked why should the public be asked to pay for a sprayer for a man who has 30 acres of orchard which would have one of his own.
Mr. Morrissey pointed out that there was a shortage of lime in the Dungarvan area and fruit sprayers were being held up.
The Acting Secretary said that in that connection a letter had been received from the Department regarding the complaint of shortage of colin
