CORRESPONDENCE

The Editor, "Dungarvan Observer."

Sir—"Experto Crede," in his letter to your esteemed paper last week, seems to have misunderstood what he himself had written. He says that the scriptures do not state that Christ died to save only Catholics. It is true, that Christ wishes all men to be saved, but the fruits of the redemption will be tasted only by those who obey the Redeemer. "Keep my Commandments," said Christ.
"Experto Crede" will read in the Scriptures, "There are conditions and one shepherd"; also, "what God had joined together let no man put asunder"; also, "whosoever will not hear the Church let him be to thee as the heathen and the publican," i.e., excommunicated.
Now, the only Church that strains to safeguard the insolvency of marriage is the Catholic Church. All other so-called christian sects permit divorce and "bless" the union of divorced people in spite of the Scripture: "Whosoever marries her that is put away committeth adultery."
"Experto Crede" speaks of a Catholic girl meeting a "good" boy and, as custodian of his path, decides to marry him. He apparently forgets the real important fact—Marriage is a Sacrament. One cannot approach a Sacrament in a haphazard manner and the Sacrament cannot be thrown at one unwilling to receive it. There are conditions to be fulfilled for the reception of each Sacrament. That is why the Church, as custodian of the Sacraments, must legislate to preserve the sacramental nature of marriage. Therefore, a Catholic parent must set the children on the path of the true Faith. But faith is not inherited; it is a free gift to each individual and an adult, to persevere in the Faith, must have personal conviction. But the duty of parents is absolute; they must nourish and train their children in the Faith. Then these, having become adults, must make a free choice—to thank it; or if they are so criminal, to spurn His gift.

As "Deiseach" pointed out in his letter, we Catholics have no desire to persecute non-Catholics. We do not rightfully claim that the laws of this Catholic country should not remain antagonistic to our Catholic Faith—the Faith of the majority of its citizens.

Kilrossanty Surmounts First Obstacle.

Kilrossanty, 2-4; De La Salle, 0-4
Possessing all the qualities that have contributed so much to the football fame of their parish, Kilrossanty gave a sterling display at Kilmacthomas (held kindly lent by Mrs. M. Shanahan) on Sunday last, when they defeated De La Salle (Waterford) by 9 points (3-4 to 0-4) in their tie in the initial round of this year's County Senior Championship Competition. De La Salle put up a plucky fight, but their forwards were outclassed by a typical Kilrossanty defence in a good robust game. Kilrossanty fielded faultlessly, and strength and dash were telling factors in their favour. Their backs were exceptionally sound, and after holding spirited assaults in the early stages, were unbeaten at the end of a trying hour. There were passages of delightful football, but Kilrossanty, particularly in the finish of their forwards, were superior, and they were in all respects deserving winners. Kilrossanty led by 0-3 to nil at the interval, Mr. Sean Ormond, N.T., Kilmacthomas, was a strictly impartial referee.
The star of the Kilrossanty side was James Power, their left half forward, who was the most dangerous forward on the field. He was the spearhead of every attack and his goal and a point at critical periods of the game proved the city side's undoing. Though hardly 20 years yet this young player has already played a great game for Waterford against Limerick in the recent Munster J.F. Championships. On Sunday next he has been selected to play at right-half forward on the Deise senior football team to meet Tipperary in Dungarvan.
Another find on the Kilrossanty side on Sunday was their right half-back, Jack Kirwan, who though still a minor, was brilliant in defence, his being his first senior game. No doubt, in those two green and gold stalwarts, the old adage, "you can't beat breeding," is truly borne out, for the former is son of that veteran Kilrossanty footballer, Mr. Johnny Power, of Gortavoir, holder of two senior and two junior championship Kilrossanty titles, and

nephew of that famous Comeragh football family, the Ryans of Leamybrien, while the latter is son of another brilliant Kilrossanty exponent of the big ball code of former years, in the person of Mr. Pádraig Kirwan, of Keatlong.
Others prominent on the winning side on Sunday were: W. Power (goal), J. ("Fog") Foley, M. Veale, J. Lonergan, W. Power, R. Maguire, M. Lynch, P. Fitzgerald, M. Fitzgerald and M. Whelan.
After eight minutes Kilrossanty opened the scoring with a goal per M. Fitzgerald from a melee. The same side had a number of wides before Organ punched through another major. De La Salle attacked but failed to penetrate the Kilrossanty defence. In a terrific onslaught J. Power sent a hard shot to the back of the net to give Kilrossanty a lead of 3-0 at the interval.
De La Salle had a strong breeze in their favour in the second half. Kilrossanty attacked and having kept up the pressure for ten minutes J. Power sent over a beauty point from an acute angle. The city side attacked and had a point. Both sides attacked in turn before P. Veale notched another minor for the Kilrossanty men. The city exerted pressure and were rewarded with a like score. The country side again won in a free land, not fully manoeuvred the city backs to leave M. Whelan with the goal at his mercy. He was pulled down, however, and P. Fitzgerald had little trouble in pointing the ensuing free. A fifty to Kilrossanty was sent over the bar, against a strong wind, by Dick Maguire. De La Salle attacked again and were rewarded with two further minors before the end.

THE PRESIDENT AT MOUNT MELLERAY.

Visitors at the Cistercian Monastery, Mount Mellerey on Tuesday, June 4th, witnessed an event of natural significance and of extremely rare occurrence in our times—the solemn reception, with full liturgical ceremonial accorded by a contemplative community to the head of the State. The scene had about it something of the picturesque and piety of a medievalistic pageant and it made one realize that whatever may be the relations between the civil and ecclesiastical authorities in other lands, in our own country at least the two are closely allied, which is as it should be. This day shall stand out as a red letter day in the annals of Mount Mellerey.
Mr. O'Kelly had until recently paid an annual visit to Mount Mellerey and in 1935 had spent some days at the Monastery's Guest House when he was accompanied by Dr. James Ryan, Minister for Agriculture and Mr. D. O'Malley. This, however, had been Mr. O'Kelly's first visit to the famous Monastery as President.
Mr. and Mrs. O'Kelly arrived at Mount Mellerey on Monday evening and were received by the Monks who accorded them all the honours of the Cistercian Order.
The party included: Mr. S. T. O'Kelly, President, and Mrs. O'Kelly; Miss Smallwood, lady-in-waiting to Mrs. O'Kelly; chaplain, Rev. Dr. Callan; aides-de-camp, Col. O'Sullivan and Command. Heffernan.
The party arrived at 8.30 and were met some distance from the Abbey by the Lord Abbot, Dom Celsus O'Connell, and Rev. Fr. Ailbe, both of whom are close friends of Mr. O'Kelly's. Between long rows of beautifully costumed students, who formed a guard of honour, the distinguished visitors were escorted to the Monastery, preceded by the Pipers Band bearing the flags of Eire.
On arrival the visitors went to the College Chapel where the Lord Abbot gave Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament after which the Sister-in-charge entertained them to tea. The gentlemen remained in the Guest House for the night. On Tuesday morning the President attended High Mass in the Sanctuary, after which he breakfasted with Mrs. O'Kelly shortly before 10 a.m. the hour fixed for the official reception. Their excellencies were then conducted by the Pipers Band along the avenue to the Public Church, flanked by a guard of honour, and preceded by the Band as on the previous evening. History was made in this century old monastery when the President stood in the Chapter House and spoke to the assembled cistercians, the first layman to do so since Daniel O'Connell visited the foundation when it was six years old, in 1838. Mrs. O'Kelly, wife of the President, stood beside him. She was the first woman ever to have entered there.
An address in Irish was read by Rev. Fr. Conleth, O.Cist., and the President replied.
Expressing gratitude for the welcome given to him and Ben Uí Ceallaigh, the President said he felt honoured and much moved by Mellerey. As President of Ireland he always felt grateful and proud, but the fact that he could so stand in the midst of the people, free to practice their religion as well as to choose their own form of Government, in a free land, not fully united, but that also he expected would soon be an accomplished fact—was due to the efforts of past generations.
The secret of Ireland's unconquerable strength, so often defeated as she was but never fully overcome, lay in the prayers and sacrifices of Ireland's holy men and women, offered up night and day. The President said he had spoken with four Popes, most often with Benedict XV; on some occasions also with the late Holy Father, and he was always impressed by the interest and detailed knowledge shown by all four not only in Irish religious but secular affairs. The Popes always said that the Irish people were justified in fighting for freedom.
The Lord Abbot, Rt. Rev. Dom. Celsus O'Connell, O.Cist., said that the honour was Mellerey's. They were proud that persons so eminent in the practice of their religion were the first to enter their home. They recognised in the President the highest measure of civil authority, conferred from on high. The movement that O'Connell had stirred up had ended with the Sinn Féin movement, that had won Ireland the freedom she now enjoyed. In very few states in Europe to-day, would they find the head of the State glorying in the missionary work of his country.
The President and Mrs. O'Kelly spoke to and shook hands with each priest and brother, from the aged Rev. Fatk. M. Walter, of Cahary, to the youngest novice in the foundation.
In the afternoon a grand concert was held for the benefit of the visitors, the students of the Monastery participating. The programme included songs, music, gymnastics and a dramatic religious play by Aodh de Blacum, "Golden Priest," with incidental music from Blessed Oliver's Plunkett's Cantata composed by Dr. Staf Gebruers. This music was rendered by the choral class and orchestra under the direction of Dr. Staf Gebruers.
Prior to their departure a reception was held at the Guest House.
