

#### THE PRESIDENT AT MOUNT MELLERAY

Visitors at the Cistercian Monastery, Mount Melleray on Tuesday, June 4th, witnessed an event of natural significance and of extremely rare occurrence in our times liturg.cal ceremonial accorded by a contemplative community to the head of the State. 
