DUNGARVAN URBAN COUNCIL

Mr. T. McCarthy, chairman, presided at the meeting of the Dungarvan U.D.C. on last Friday. Also present—Messrs. J. Kyne, L. A. Veale, P. O'Dwyer, J. McGrath, P. O'Dwyer, N. Kelly, M. Morrissey, W. S. J. Moyhinan, the Manager, J. Ormonde, Acting Borough Surveyor, and M. O'Meara, Acting Town Clerk.

On the proposition of Mr. Kyne, seconded by Mr. L. Veale, the combined rate of 21/- in the £, adopted at the rates meeting, was struck.

CLEANING OF THE STRANDS. Mr. Veale drew attention to Quann's Strand and said that what had been done was very well done. He thought, however, that they should go further, they should go to the end of the church wall. The place around there was full of old rusty iron and he suggested that it should be either cleaned or a new one put down.

Mr. Veale drew attention to the road leading to the strand at Abbeyside and said that at the strand was a lot of stones which made it difficult to get out.

Acting Borough Surveyor—The trouble about cleaning strands is that no sooner are they cleaned, in a few weeks they are as bad over.

Acting Borough Surveyor—It wouldn't be a bad idea if a notice were put up there forbidding the dumping of rubbish.

Mr. Veale—Rubbish is being dumped wholesale there.

The Manager said that at Abbeyside the stones were always there where the road leads to the strand. The Acting Borough Surveyor said there was no hope of cleaning the strand of stones because the next tide would bring them again.

Mr. Veale—Will that be sufficient to the council now to consider that? Mr. Veale referred to overcrowded houses and asked if any scheme would apply to them. He thought that it should apply.

Acting Borough Surveyor—All these houses have been condemned with the exception of two.

Mr. Morrissey—That's no reason why these houses in Shandon should not be made habitable.

Acting Borough Surveyor—If they do not comply with the conditions, they cannot be made habitable. I don't know if they could attend or not.

Chairman—Would it not be as well to adjourn it to the next meeting? In the meantime to adjourn further discussion on the sites to the next meeting and in the meantime it was decided that the members inspect the site at Gallowishill.

Mr. Veale—If these houses were left stand they could be kept for old people. They could be let at a reasonable rent.

Mr. Veale—It would be a pity to knock houses at present if they can be improved.
