RECORD ENTRIES

"One of the best Shows ever" was the popular verdict of the large gathering that came to Dungarvan on Thursday for the revival of the local Agricultural Show. The success was, indeed, well-merited, for it contained all the first-class features that in bygone days made this Show such an outstanding and successful one.

The day was an ideal one, with brilliant sunshine flooding the Show Grounds and making the whole scene one of very pleasing animation and colour. From an early hour competitors were busy preparing and grooming their exhibits, each hope-
fully expecting that his or her entry would catch the judges' eye. In the horse rings spirited hunters showed their mettle to admiring spectators, while in the other rings high-class progeny cattle paraded with stately grace, oblivious of the appreciative comments of the onlookers.

For those uninterested in live-stock exhibits, the home industries section proved a very pleasant surprise. Here were temptingly displayed fruit, jam and jellies, vegetables, home-made cakes, etc., that attracted many en-
thusiastic glances from the vast crowds of onlookers. The Needlework Section also drew its own quota of ad-
mirers, while the stand reserved for the flowers, with its beautiful picture of dazzling colour, the Dungarvan Brass and Reed Band, under the baton of Mr. T. Costin, played a delightful selection of music throughout the evening.

The special stand on view arranged by the officials, with the help of a committee of Agriculture, was an exhibit that deserves special mention and should be seen to appreciate the amount of work put in by the officials of the Agricultural, Horticultural and Poultry Branches. Here all could see the results of the best of the sprayed and unsprayed stalks, the ravages of the Wable Flea on cattle hides, and the remedy for these and all the ills that attack the orchard or garden or the poultry. Needless to say, it aroused considerable interest.
