Cappoquin's Convincing Win Over Irish Tanners.

PORTLAW GIVE DISAPPOINTING DISPLAY.

Cappoquin, 3-5; Irish Tanners, 0-1.

A fast, lively Cappoquin fifteen were not unduly pressed to defeat very poor Irish Tanners side, in the Waterford senior hurling county championship, at the Gaelic field, Dungarvan, on last Sunday. As the championship is played on the league system, Cappoquin have now collected full points from their two games to date. Although a Cappoquin victory was not considered unlikely, their 13 points winning margin must indeed be considered a major surprise. The "Cornerstone" representatives made no secret of the fact that they had trained hard for the engagement, because they realised that their East Waterford opponents were, and always have been, a tough proposition. On last Sunday, however, the Portlaw side's display was very mediocre and was most disappointing. In the first half Cappoquin actually made rings around them. Concentrating on first-time, full-blooded, ground-hurling, Cappoquin had the opposition well bottled up from the start, and as the scores mounted in favour of Cappoquin, it looked as if Irish Tanners were in for a veritable rout. That it did not actually turn out to have such a result may be accounted for by the fact that some of the Cappoquin forwards were somewhat too over-eager in their quest for scores.

Favouring a "lift and hit" style of game, Portlaw could get nowhere against the fast-moving, nippy Cappoquin men. Judgment from the way some of the Irish Tanners' side continuously tried to rise the ball, even though invariably "fence-in" by two or more of the opposition, one got the impression that they knew very little about the art of ground play. At the end of the first moiety they should have surely got wise to the fact that this type of play was not paying any dividend. But apparently they choose to ignore it, with the result that their continued efforts at this stage were extremely foolish, and not a little ludicrous to watch.

In the first moiety Cappoquin dominated the exchanges throughout and were easily on top at midfield, where O'Connor was outstanding. He looks a very promising player, and it is rather surprising that he did not appear in any of the trial or challenge games at the beginning of the year. All the Cappoquin side played very soundly and well merited their victory.

Starting off in striking manner, Cappoquin were a goal up per Ronayne within a few minutes, a fine solo effort by Sargent some minutes later deserved a better fate than the wide that resulted. Ryan, however, shortly after made up for it when he pointed. The same player was in hard luck in not registering a similar score a little later. In a Portlaw attack Wade had the Cappoquin goal at his mercy but sent wide. After successfully weathering a Portlaw offensive, Cappoquin again took up the running and Ryan added another major. A free to Portlaw at midfield was cleared and Cappoquin again resumed the offensive, forcing a 70. O'Connor's pock was cleared but he sent in again and the Portlaw goal had a very narrow escape. In a Portlaw attack the forwards were im-

pressive and Cappoquin had not much difficulty repulsing it. Following some midfield exchanges Ryan secured and sent over for a minor. The same player was on the mark again some minutes later with another minor. Continuing the pressure Cappoquin added another goal to lead at half-time by 3-3 to nil.

On resuming Portlaw broke away and had a wide. Returning the delivery the forwards lost a "dead" score. A Cappoquin raid proved fruitless and Portlaw visited again without result. Portlaw at this stage were improving but the forwards could make no headway against a sound Cappoquin back-line. Following the arrival of a Portlaw player they had a free 50 yards out which resulted in Doyle getting their first and only score—a point. A Cappoquin raid followed, and when a Portlaw back fouled Ryan had another white flag from the free. After both sides had visited in turn Cappoquin had a free 60 yards out. Ryan centred well and a Cappoquin forward tested the Portlaw goalie with a hard ball but he saved in brilliant fashion. Portlaw attacked and forced a 70, but the puck was cleared and sent well up another Cappoquin offensive, which yielded a minor from Crotty to close the scoring.

Death of Mr. Michael Hanrahan.

BALLINACOURTY, DUNGARVAN.

The announcement of the death of Mr. Michael Hanrahan, which took place on Friday, 19th July, at his residence, Ballinacorty, Dungarvan, was learned by his numerous friends with expressions of deepest regret. He was a well-known, industrious farmer and was one of the pioneers of early potato growing and shipping in this area, while as a market gardener in the handling and care of vegetable crops, which he grew extensively, he had few equals, and as well as supplying the local market, the produce from his farm supplied no small proportion of the Waterford and Dublin vegetable markets. The remains were received by the Rev. M. Power, C.C. On Sunday following the celebration of Holy Mass at 9.30 a.m. interment took place in the adjoining cemetery in the presence of another large and representative attendance.
