Again, if 'fowl pie' is urgently required, the hint takes this most helpful form, 'First of all, slowly cook the fowl for about six hours. Having no personal knowledge of the culinary arts, except in so far as the brewing of a cup of tea, and the boiling of eggs is concerned, I am in no way to be considered upon the hints given above, but in the matter of time-saving these hints seem to be a little bit (a very little bit) of all right.' Try them, dear bean-aighe, but remove both knife and fork out of hubby's reach while he is waiting for the tip that spiced beef or that fowl pie. A week, or even six hours, might strike the wearer of a Sunday newspaper as an unconscionably long time, and might even cause him to 'run amuck'—'The Story of Mount Melony' 'amuck' has a far blonder sort of sound.
