

Where poisoning is resorted to, it must be carefully practised, the baits being so laid that they will not be accessible to fowl or domestic aniaccessible to fowl or domestic animals, and notices being exhibited in places where the baits are laid warning people to keep dogs and other animals away. These places should be carefully recorded and visited regularly and the baits destroyed if not successful in a short period.

The poisons recommended for use in preparing the baits are generally in preparing the baits are generally red squill and barium carbonate. Red Squill should be fresh as it loses its potency after some time. Barium Carbonate powder can be obtained, but orders therefor should be given at an early date, as stocks of this commodity, are not usually held by

modity are not usually held by Chemists. The following recipes containing that poison have been recommended as being easy to prepare and effective in use:—

(1) Barium Carbonate Powder, 1
part by weight; Rolled Oats, 2 parts
by weight; Dripping, 1 part by weight.

into a thick paste, but in summer use (2) Barium Carbonate Powder, 1 part by weight; Fine Oatmeal, 2 parts by weight; Castor Oil, 1 part by

weight.

When using these baits it is well to distribute them liberally at the first application, and to lay at least ten times as many baits as the number of rats estimated to be present. It will be well to vary the form and appearance of the bests at intervals. It is not recommended that strong poisons such as Thallium Sulphate, Arsenic, or Phosphorus should besused, in view of the danger to domestic animals or poultry. tic animals or poultry.
