Ballymacarbery & Nire Valley Musings.

Recent Floods.—The heavy rain in the early hours of Friday morning of last week caused extensive damage in the Nire and Ballymacarbery districts. Corn in the low-lying land along the banks of the Nire river was swept away, causing further losses to the already harassed farmers in this area. The flood, which was the result of a cloudburst in the Comeragh mountains, led to a depth of from eight to ten feet in places, was the biggest ever seen in the river. A small bridge on the road which leads to the Nire church was severely damaged, and houses in the valley were inundated to a depth of several feet. This particular bridge in question is rather an eyesore in what is otherwise a picturesque little valley. It would be a laudable project on the part of the authorities concerned to have a structure of more durable nature erected here, either with a concrete wall or some other material leading from it to the big bridge some 150 or 200 yards away, thereby minimising the danger to life and property. School children from the nearby schools, lacking a suitable playground, spend their early hours of the day in the vicinity of the bridge, which is a veritable death-trap. Farmers, too, when driving sheep or cattle in the early hours of a dark winter's morning to the monthly fair held at Clonmel, run considerable risk to themselves and their animals at this particular spot. So let those who think that the matter will receive attention at an early date.

Late Mr. Andrew O'Shea.—The death, following a brief illness and at a moderately advanced age, of Mr. Andrew O'Shea, which occurred at the residence of his nephew, Mr. Henry Butler, Kilmaree, Ballymacarbery, on Saturday, 28th inst., has occasioned deep and widespread regret. To his bereaved relatives the deepest sympathy is tendered. COUNTY COMMITTEE OF AGRICULTURE

Mr. P. R. Power, Chairman, presided at the monthly meeting of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture, at the Courthouse, Dungarvan, on last Saturday. Also present: Messrs. M. McGrath, D. Coghlan, J. Mansfield, M. Hart, J. Pines, Denis Heskin, T.D.; D. Hurley, Acting Secretary, and the Committee's other officers. Mr. J. Mills, Department Inspector, was also present.

VOLUNTARY HARVEST HELP SCHEME.—The Acting Secretary read correspondence from the Department regarding the emergency scheme for voluntary harvest help, and said that they went straight away with the scheme and did not wait for a report yet for a complete report on the scheme, seeing that the work was not yet finished.

ROAD FLOODING.—Replying to the Committee's resolution regarding repairs to roads leading to farm houses, damaged by the flooding, a letter from the Department was read in which it was stated that such repairs could be carried out under the rural improvements scheme, subject to a contribution by the beneficiaries. The Chairman said that the usual contribution was one-fourth. If the road connected with a main road, he thought that more than 75 per cent was given.

DESTRUCTION OF FOXES.—A resolution from the Co. Waterford Sheepbreeders' Association asking for the committee's help in the destruction of foxes in the county was read.

Mr. Hart said that the amount of damage caused by foxes in this county must run into thousands of pounds. Mr. Coghlan said that in his place he was bothered by foxes killing the poultry, but he got a fox terrier and there were no foxes around there since.

Mr. Mansfield said there was a good number of foxes in his area and they were killing game. If the destruction continued there would be pheasants or other game left. It would be no harm to thin out the foxes.

Mr. Hart suggested offering a certain amount to co-operative stores which purchased fowl or game for every fox brought in. Mr. Heskin said he doubted if he would be wise to have one scheme for the whole county. There was a lot of destruction caused by dogs too.

The Secretary suggested that the Association be asked to formulate a scheme themselves and submit it to the next meeting. This was agreed to.

DAMAGE TO CROPS BY FLOODING.—Replying to a question by Mr. Heskin, if there was any reply from the Department regarding the Committee's resolution regarding the help farmers compensated in respect of crops damaged by flooding, the Acting Secretary said there had been no reply.

Mr. Heskin said they should draw the Minister's attention to the matter again. He thought it very unfair of the Government. The people entered wholeheartedly into the production of food, and owing to circumstances beyond their control, their crops were destroyed. Continuing, Mr. Heskin said he made representations to the Minister in the matter and was told that there was no fund at the disposal of the Government whereby farmers could be compensated for damage to their crops by flooding. The losses suffered by some farmers were considerable, in some cases it was as much as fifty per cent. He (Mr. Heskin) asked the Minister if an inspector could be sent so that an estimate of the damage caused could be made by an independent valuer, but he had got a letter from the Minister saying that he would not have an inspection made. He (Mr. Heskin) thought that they should ask the Minister to recoup these farmers for at least some out-of-pocket expenses. He thought that that was not an unreasonable request to make. This was agreed to.

MOISTURE CONTENT OF WHEAT.—Mr. Heskin said there was a matter raised by Mr. Hart at the last meeting in connection with the moisture content of wheat. He (Mr. Heskin) got in touch with the Department, but got no reply. He asked the Acting Secretary if he had got a reply.

Acting Secretary.—No. Mr. Heskin said it was very unfair that a reduction should be made this year particularly for moisture content.

FRUIT TREE PRICES.—Replying to the Committee's letter asking for a reduction in their quotation for fruit trees, Messrs. Watson & Son wrote stating that owing to increased costs (wages, materials, etc.), they were unable to improve their quotation prices.

The tender was accepted. Mr. Hart raised the question of making available lorries for farmers to draw corn which was a long way from haggards. He had a conversation with the Manager about making available the County Council lorries for this work. The Acting Secretary said that he had got in touch with the Department and his information was that there would be no allowance of petrol for such work, but that the Department would have no objection to making available increased allowances of kerosene for tractors. Mr. Hurley added that the County Council had only one tractor.

Mr. Hart.—The Department is not co-operating in the interests of the country. They were able to supply plenty of petrol to the Army during the war. I suggest that petrol be made available by the Department to the County Council for their lorries for this purpose. The Acting Secretary pointed out that the County Council had only three lorries.

Mr. Mansfield said that every farmer should get a chance. Mr. Hart's suggestion was agreed to.

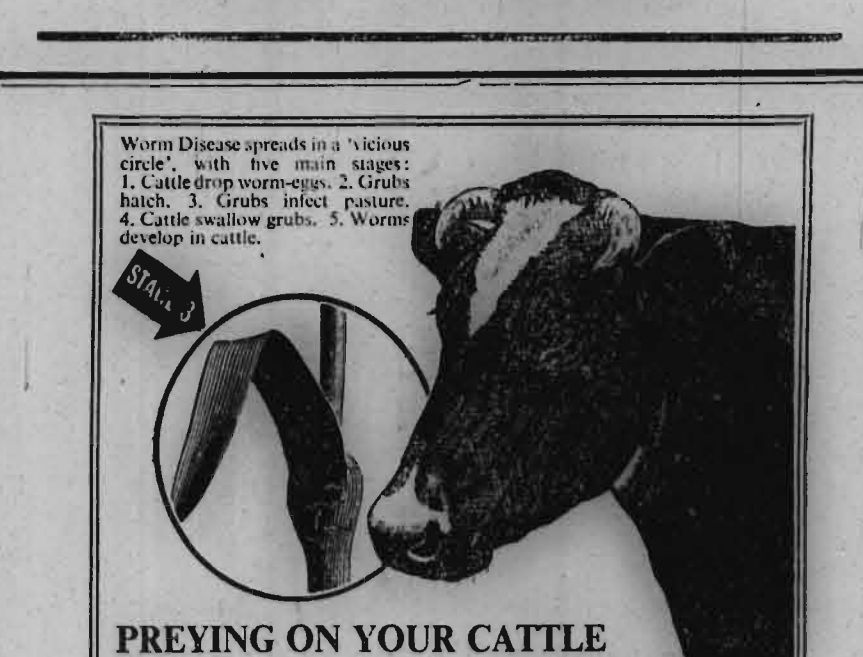
