

He stood on the scales with the leadcloth and the lead, but, as he did not make the full 13 stone, he sent his brother for some more lead. He again did not make the full weight and borrowed lead from John Twomey in the tent. He got on the scales once more and brought down 13 stone. His brother packed all the lead into the leadcloth, which was put on the horse by him (his brother) and the saddle was put over that. Witness mounted and went to the starting post.

The horse started very quickly— it jumped off in front—and he went round the full course and was not passed. He won the race by 400 or 500 yards. When he had passed the winning post he pulled up and walked the horse to the stand, still sitting on his back, and dismounted at the dismounting place. Nicholas Walsh, who had been riding, congratulated him.

Having unsaddled, witness went to the weighing-in tent and to the scales with his saddle and leadcloth. He did not interfere with the lead-cloth in any way and there was no difference in it after coming in when he was weighed and made 13 stone.
