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What's wrong with our Farming System?

The quantity of butter in reserve just now is less than a year ago; bacon is so scarce that certain people are prepared to go to the black market for it; fresh eggs are virtually unobtainable for the average townspeople...

All of which points to a very unhealthy state of affairs in our Agricultural economy. Is the low price of store cattle due to the excess numbers being thrown on the market because of shortage of feeding?

Are we breeding good looking rather than good milk-yielding cattle? Are cheap imported feedstuffs essential to pig and poultry production?

Many countries have found it necessary to change their systems of production. We in this country have reached a point where a change is essential too.

These important matters of intense, practical and immediate interest to all farmers, and the type of change which is essential will be discussed by the Agricultural Correspondent in this column.

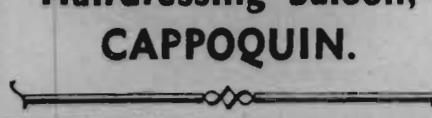
