







LONDON AUDIENCE Call for Abolition of Partition.

A resolution demanding "Repeal of the Government of Ireland Act, 1920, which enacted partition, and the withdrawal of the British forces from the occupied Six Counties of the national territory, was passed at a meeting of the Anti-Partition of Ireland League in Shepherd's Bush, London, on Sunday, December 15th.

The meeting, at which the London campaign of the League was launched, pledged itself to take all constitutional steps to secure the independence of a United Ireland.

Mr. Cahill Healy, M.P., said Ireland was a national and geographical entity, and the population was too small to maintain two Governments.

He said that the British Government was not responsible for the partitioning of Ireland, and that it could not be held responsible for the strife which it had caused.
