

"It is probably true to say that during the next six months the general position in regard to the supplies of many essential goods will be more difficult than at any stage during the war," he said. "There are, however, good grounds for belief that after this coming six months, difficult though they may be, there will be an end to some of our main supply problems, and that these prosupply problems, and that these problems will be considerably lighter in the second half of the year."

GRAIN SUPPLIES.

The difficulties of the coming months, he said, could not be avoided. The Government had been reluctant to contemplate bread rationing. In this country, where such a large prothis country, where such a large proportion of the population was directly or indirectly concerned with the production of grain, the rationing of bread was a matter of greater difficulty than in some other countries. culty than in some other countries.

"You may assume that the Government has decided on the step only

Traders Should Cut This Out And Keep For Reference.

1—It has not been possible up to the present to obtain the quantities of foreign wheat which were necessary to supplement the home supply from the last harvest, and the future position in regard to supplies from abroad is still uncertain. The very bad weather experienced during the harvesting period affected supplies also, both as regards quantity and quality.

2—The Government has deemed it advisable, therefore, to ration flour and bread so as to conserve those supplies of wheat which are available, and the Minister for Industry and Commerce has, accordingly, made Orders entitled Flour and Bread (Rationing) Order, 1946 and Flour and Bread (Rationing) Order, 1946 (Supplemental Provisions) (No. 1) Order, 1946, under which the rationing of these commodities will operate as from Saturday, the 18th January, 1947. Copies of the Order will be on sale

The weekly ration has been fixed for the present at 4½ lbs. of flour or 6 lbs. of bread per person. For the purposes of the ration "bread" is deemed to include "flour confectionery," and where the word "bread" is mentioned without amplification in this Notice, it must be interpreted accordingly. Biscuits do not come under the rationing scheme.

The first ration period will be the twenty-six weeks commencing on Saturday, the 18th January, 1947, and from that date flour or bread may not be obtained except in accordance with the provisions of the Order.

5—PROCEDURE TO BE ADOPTED BY DOMESTIC CONSUMERS IN ORDER TO OBTAIN THEIR WEEKLY RATIONS. DOMESTIC CONSUMERS ARE THOSE WHO HAVE BEEN ISSUED WITH EITHER A GENERAL RATION BOOK OR A SPECIAL RATION BOOK.

(a) Domestic consumers should register at once for either flour or bread or for both with the retailer or retailers with whom they normally (b) To register, the same procedure should be followed as in the case

(c) Pages 27F and 28G of the General Ration Book are to be used for flour and bread rationing by those who have been issued with a General Ration Book. Holders of Special Ration Books will receive on application

(h) A domestic consumer who normally purchases bread from a baker's vanman may register with the baker by lodging registration pages with the vanman who, for the purpose of registration, will be regarded as the

(i) A householder may register for supplies for all the members of the household together. (j) For example, for a household of five persons which requires flour only, the ten pages should be lodged for flour. Similarly, if the household ires bread only, the 10 pages should be lodged for bread. If desired, the householder may lodge one page for flour and the remaining nine pages for bread, or two pages for flour and the remaining eight for bread,

(k) A domestic consumer who has registered for bread may take all or part of the bread ration in flour confectionery or a registration page may be lodged specially for flour confectionery with the retailer from whom flour confectionery is normally purchased.

(1) In order to avoid undue disturbance of the existing channels of distribution householders are requested to register as far as possible with the retailers from whom they normally purchase supplies, and for this purpose the registration pages may be distributed amongst different

(m) To facilitate domestic consumers, especially in rural areas, the sationing Order provides that up to four weeks' ration of flour may be purchased at any one time, but where this concession is availed of, the purchase cannot be repeated for a further four weeks.

(n) Domestic consumers registered for bread are entitled to obtain from the retailer with whom they are registered a Householder's Bread Ration Card (F.B.R.6) on which the weekly entitlement of bread and the quantity purchased during a ration week must be recorded. One card may be used to cover all members of a household who are registered with a particular retailer. The Householder's Bread Ration Card must be produced when bread is purchased, and it is essential that it should not be lost or mislaid. The purchase of flour should not be recorded on this

(o) It is most important to register at once for supplies, so that the traders may be able to make their arrangements to obtain the necessary supplies of flour and bread for their registered customers as soon as the rationing scheme commences to operate. Domestic consumers who do not register in time may not be able to get their rations of flour and bread

6—HOLDERS OF FOOD RATION CARDS: Visitors who already hold Food Ration Cards may obtain a special Food Ration Card (Flour and Bread) by applying at the local Garda Barracks in about a week's time. This card will also be available for visitors during the currency of flour and bread rationing. Each card will be valid for one

(b) On each page lodged for flour, the retailer must write the word "flour," and on each page lodged for bread he must write the word "bread," if this has not already been done by the consumer.

(c) The retailer must retain the pages lodged with him. On the inside of the cover of the ration book he must enter his name, the address of his shop the number of the page (or the number of the pages) lodged and

(f) Wholesalers of Flour must use Form F.R.B.2 to obtain supplies of flour meet demands made to them on Forms F.B.R.1 received from retailers of flour, F.B.R.5 received from Bakers or flour confectioners and F.R.B.2 received from other wholesalers of Flour. Copies of this form are being issued direct to Wholesalers who are licensed to sell flour by wholesale under the licensing scheme which was in operation up to October, 1944. Wholesalers of Flour who do not receive the forms within one week or who require additional copies should notify the Secretary, Department of Industry and Commerce (Room 203), Kildare Street, Department of Industry and Commerce (Room 203), Kildare Street, or the staff very patient. Cards (Flour or Bread) and Permits. The necessary supplies may be
obtained by following the instructions which are printed on these documents.

All persons who are using flour and/or bread whose requirements are not covered by the foregoing paragraphs—e.g., sausage manufacturers or domestic cookery classes—must make immediate application to the Secretary Department of Industry and Commerce (Room 203), Kildare Street Dublin.

12—ENFORCEMENT OF THE ORDER:

Retail traders must keep weekly records of stocks receipts and disposals of flour and bread (including flour confectionery). Form F.B.R.7 must be used for this purpose. Copies of this Form may be obtained at all Post Offices, price 2d. These Forms should be kept up to date weekly and be available for inspection by the Department's officers on demand.

13—Every trader must keep records showing every purchase by wholesale or sale by wholesale of bread or flour made by him. 14—CANCELLATION OF COUPONS:

Retail traders must cancel the appropriate flour and bread coupons each week against sales to their registered customers by endorsing, with an indelible pencil or indelible ink on the coupon the mark "X."
