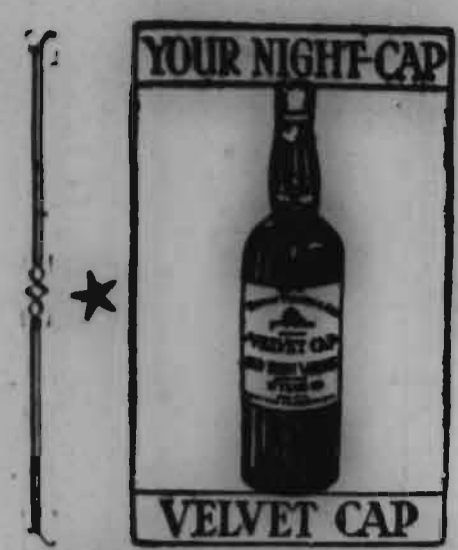

BREAD RATIONING SIX POUNDS A WEEK FOR EACH PERSON

Mr. Lemass announced in a broadcast that bread will be rationed in Eire from January 18. The basic ration, he added, will be five pounds per week, or 4½ lbs. of flour, and the bread will be whiter and more palatable, as the oil extraction will be reduced from 90 per cent. to 85 per cent. The Government had been reluctant to contemplate bread rationing, and the step had only been taken when there was no practical alternative, the Minister declared. It was impossible to forecast definitely how long rationing would be in force, but he hoped it would be possible to abolish it by next September, and possibly earlier.

There will be a flat ration of flour and bread for every individual, Mr. Lemass said. "That is the most practical system of regulating bread consumption, having regard to our existing rationing arrangements. The system will, I believe, work reasonably well so long as the ration can be maintained at a satisfactory level. If the ration has to be reduced, the system of rationing will also require reconsideration."

The basic ration at the start will be five lbs. of bread per person per week or 4½ lbs. of flour. The importance of the confectionery industry has not been overlooked, but purchases of flour confectionery will have to form part of the ration.

"Families will be able to draw their rations in the form of flour, bread and flour confectionery in whatever proportion they desire."

WHITER LOAF. Mr. Lemass also announced that, having considered expert advice, he had come to the conclusion that under the rationing system they could make the best use of the wheat available by reducing the rate of extraction from 90 to 85 per cent., which would make the bread of whiter colour and more palatable.

"The reduction of wastage in baking and in the house will, it is hoped, go some way to offset the additional (imported) wheat required, and it is the only satisfactory feature of the situation, that with rationing we should have a better quality of bread. During the war years he had hoped that he would be able to announce, when the war had ended, periodic improvement of supplies, the enlargement of rations, and the eventual withdrawal of restrictions, but the end of hostilities instead brought a reduction of supply difficulties, had, in many respects, increased them."

"It is probably true to say that during the war years the ordinary general position in regard to the supplies of many essential goods will be more difficult to maintain than during the war," he said. "There are, however, good grounds for belief that after this coming six months, difficult though they may be, there will be an end to some of our main supply problems, and that these problems will be considerably lighter in the second half of the year."

GRAIN SUPPLIES. The difficulties of the coming months, he said, could not be avoided. The Government had been reluctant to contemplate bread rationing in this country, where such a large proportion of the population was directly or indirectly concerned with the production of grain, the rationing of bread was a matter of greater difficulty than in some other countries. "You may assume that the Government has decided on the step only because it is convinced that there is no practical alternative," he said. "The reasons why bread rationing should now be necessary may not, perhaps, be easy to understand, because of some statements published in the Press concerning large wheat crops in some countries," he said. "In fact, however, the world's grain supplies were exhausted and there was not the normal carry-over of reserves from one harvest to another. Despite the good crops in some of the main producing countries, the total world supplies of wheat are insufficient to meet all needs."

"There are no countries which, like ourselves, have ordinarily to import a substantial proportion of their wheat requirements in which bread is not rationed. Because of the world supply and distribution problems for grain, there has been a multiplication of international official organisations, councils, committees and so forth which, in one way or another, decide how the essential needs of mankind are to be allocated and distributed."

"The difficulties of these international organisations in reaching equitable and equitable decisions, in face of the many urgent claims on available supplies, will be easily appreciated. That applies particularly to wheat. Whatever the difficulties, considerations are which determine the decisions of the international bodies controlling wheat supplies, all we know definitely is that Ireland is at present getting no share of the available supplies."

"NO ALLOCATION." It may be that supplies will be allocated to us later in the year, but we have no definite assurance that it will be so. We have got about 34,000 tons of wheat and 8,000 tons of flour since August last, that is since the beginning of the cereal year. In previous years we imported roughly 140,000 tons, the U.S. slightly more. In the cereal year 1938-1939 we imported 450,000 tons of wheat, of which Canada supplied, roughly, 140,000 tons, the U.S. slightly more, and Australia slightly less.

"In the months of November and December of 1946 we got no allocations of wheat, and we are getting none for the present month," the Minister continued.

"We cannot depend on our own resources all the wheat we require. The national diet includes a relatively big percentage of bread. We continue to get about half our needs from our own farms, but the rest we get from abroad, and we cannot risk a situation arising some month hence when we might be left without any wheat. A tightening of the restrictions on wheat flour mills has been operating for some years, just would merely create a danger of dislocation of distribution arrangements and, in any case, there is no alternative to rationing."

"We in Ireland fully realise the present difficulties of many countries in the matter of food supplies, and within the limits of our resources, we have endeavoured to do as much as any other country to contribute to the alleviation of distress which the war occasioned in Europe," said Mr. Lemass.

DEATH OF REV. FR. CANICE, PRIOR, MT. MELLERAY.

The Community of Mount Mellerey Abbey has suffered a deep loss by the death which took place on Monday January 6th, of Rev. Fr. Canice Maher, Prior, at the age of sixty-three years. Well known for his great piety and zeal, Fr. Canice was a most efficient and conscientious administrator of the Abbey. He was born at Cappoquin, Co. Wick, and was educated at the National School, Cappoquin, and at the Mount Mellerey College as a novice in 1888, and on May 3rd, 1916, he was ordained to the priesthood. He was Dean of the school from 1921 to 1931 and in the latter year he was appointed Prior by the late Lord Abbot Stanislaus. Some time ago Fr. Canice was elected as the first Abbot of the new Cistercian Monastery at New Mellifont, but owing to health reasons he was unable to accept the position. The interment took place on Wednesday morning following Solemn Requiem Mass. The celebrant of the Mass was Rev. Dom Celsus O'Connell, Lord Abbot of Down. Fr. Canice was sub-deacon, Fr. Ronan; assistant priest, Fr. Colman. There were 50 priests and 100 laymen in the choir, each of whom will offer five Masses for the repose of Fr. Canice's soul. Sugar Strike.

At a meeting of the Officer Board of the National Agricultural Extension & Development Association, 3 Stephen's Green, Dublin, it was agreed that some public acknowledgment be made to the Rev. Fr. Hayes, P.P., for his successful intervention in the sugar factories dispute. Short as the stoppage lasted, it caused the widespread trouble, every citizen from the youngest to the oldest person having to endure a cut in their sugar ration. How much more serious the position would quickly have become if a settlement of the dispute were not reached. The Manager of the National Agricultural Executive Committee, Mr. J. Walsh, expressed his appreciation of the direct effect which all felt, there was a considerable amount of unemployment in secondary industries which would continue without sugar supplies. Efforts to end the strike seemed to have failed completely. Mr. Hayes, P.P., was the author of His Lordship, the Archbishop of Tuam, the strikers agreed to meet the National Executive Committee on Friday, P.P. Within 24 hours the strike was over, the men having agreed to move the water mains on to Fr. Hayes's appeal.
