WHOLESALE TRADERS (OTHER THAN BAKERS)

Wholesalers of bread and flour confectionery must use Form F.B.R.4 to obtain supplies to meet the demands sent on Form F.B.R.1 by their customers.

Wholesalers of flour must use Form F.B.R.2 to obtain supplies of flour to meet the demands (1) received on Form F.B.R.1 from their retail customers; (2) received on Form F.B.R.2 from other flour wholesale customers; and (3) received on Form B.B.R.5 from bakers.

Copies of Forms F.B.R.2 and 4 may be obtained free of charge from the Department of Industry and Commerce (Room 203), Kildare Street, Dublin.

BAKERS AND FLOUR CONFECTIONERS must use Form F.B.R.5 to obtain supplies of flour for use in their bakeries. These Forms may be obtained free of charge from the Department of Industry and Commerce (Room 203), Kildare Street, Dublin.

Demands for flour for manufacture into bread and flour confectionery should not exceed the quantity which it is known from experience is required to produce the bread and flour confectionery for which demands have been received under the rationing scheme.

IMPORTANT—Forms F.B.R.1, 2, 3 4 and 5 must be prepared in duplicate. The original must be sent direct to your usual supplier.
