





Deliveries on sale under and in accordance with any permit authorising the purchase of coal (other than anthracite) during the month of February, 1947, must not in the aggregate exceed three-fourths of the quantity authorised by such permit to be Deliveries on sale during February, 1947, under and in accord-

ance with any permit authorising the purchase of a quantity of coal (other than anthracite) during the period of six months ended 31st May, 1947, must not in the aggregate exceed (i) one-eighth (121%) of the quantity specified on the permit, or (ii) the undrawn balance, whichever is the lesser.

Deliveries on sale during the month of February, 1947, under and in accordance with any permit headed Class A.C. authorising the purchase of anthracite must not, in the aggregate, exceed one-twentieth of the quantity specified on the permit as Normal Annual Consumption.
