pointed in the county. DESTRUCTION OF FOXES. The Department approved of the Committee's allocation of £100 to the scheme for the destruction of foxes in the mountain districts of the county. The letter added that the Minister was not prepared to approve of the allocation being given to the Sheep Breeders' Association or the administration of the scheme being carried out by that body. Details of similar schemes in operation by other Committees of Agriculture were enclosed with the letter for the guidance

of the Committee The principal poincipal points in the scheme were:
(1) Applicants for payment in respect of a fox destroyed must produce the dead body of the fox in the presence of a Garda at a Garda Station and the tongue of the dead fox must be cut out; (2) the claim must be countersigned by a member of the Garda and then forwarded to the Committee of Agriculture. Acting Secretary—They do not lay down the amount to be paid per fox.

If you give £I a fox that would account for only 100 foxes.

Mr. Leahy—Have you any information from the Hunt Clubs of what they will give?
Acting Secretary—That's a matter

for the Hunt Clubs themselves to give Mr. Harty—it's a matter for them o subsidise the scheme. What is being paid in other counties? Acting Secretary—I don't know, but I have an idea it is 10s. a fox. After the members had expressed


