**HATCHING EGGS.**  
 The Department wrote stating that they were prepared to extend the date in respect of the sale of hatching eggs in the different breeds.

**PREMIUM BULLS.**  
 Arising from a letter from the Department approving of the transfer of a premium bull, Mr. Hart asked if any premiums were left over. He had been asked to make inquiries in the matter.

**ADOPTION OF SCHEMES.**

## COUNTY BOARD G.A.A.

The Waterford G.A.A. Co. Board, at a meeting at Dungarvan on Wednesday night, unanimously agreed to empower the Secretary (Mr. D. Guid) to make recommendation to the Munster Council to mitigate the suspensory sentence on the Erin's Own Club to 6 months, on condition that the letter of apology and withdrawal (published in "Dungarvan Observer" last week) is published this week in the Waterford City papers.

The letter, which the Secretary read, stating he had received it from the Erin's Own Club, stated: "On behalf of Cumann Rogha Eipeara we wish to unreservedly withdraw the letter which we caused to be published in the public Press last October and to tender our apologies to the officials and members of the Board for any inconvenience or unpleasantness which may have occurred as a result of our action and to assure the officials and members of the Board of our determination and sincere desire to do everything in our power to assist them in their efforts to further the cause of Gaelic games in our county during the coming year." The letter was signed by the Chairman and Secretary of the Club.

The decision was made after a long discussion on the letter, during which there were many interruptions and which was characterized by what the Chairman (Ald. W. Kennelly) described as "crossfire" by the members.

During the discussion it was stated that the letter of apology was published in the Dungarvan Press but not in the Waterford City papers. The Chairman explained that he had given a duplicate of the letter (which he received from the Co. Board Secretary) to Mr. "Fad" Brown and the latter had given the duplicate to the Dungarvan papers and had not received it back in time for publication in the city papers. He (Chairman) assured the Board that it would be published this week.
