**S.H. MATCH AT CAPPOQUIN**  
DUNGARVAN WINS DULL ENCOUNTER.

The Senior Hurling Championship match (1st Round) between Dungarvan and Brickey Rangers was played at the Sportsfield, Cappoquin, on Sunday last in ideal conditions and before a tremendous gathering. The game was a very disappointing one and lacked anything in the way of thrills or excitement. Dungarvan had an easy victory over their opponents, who incidentally lacked some of their most promising players. The game commenced sharp on time with Dungarvan immediately going into the attack to send wide. Brickeys transferred and getting a free 21 yards out tried for a goal with a rasping shot which was deflected over the bar for a point to open the scoring. After some brisk midfield exchanges, the game again pressed and were rewarded by their first score, a point, and quickly followed with a major which was followed in quick succession by two more points. With this substantial lead the Brickeys fought gallantly back, but were unable to break through their opponents' defences. Even exchanges marked the ensuing play, but Dungarvan added another point to their already high score sheet before the close of the first half, thus leaving the half-time score: Dungarvan, 1 goal 4 points; Brickey Rangers, 1 point.

Lively exchanges marked the opening of the second half, both teams going all out for scores. Dungarvan was sent to the attack, but the ball was driven wide. The Brickeys attacked from the pick-out but had had luck for a score. The Brickeys were striving desperately now for scores, and although opportunities in plenty came their way they seemed to be in hard luck right through and all their efforts resulted in wides. The final score was: Dungarvan, 5 goals 5 points; Brickey Rangers, 1 goal 2 points.

**Dungarvan Industrial and Tourist Development Association.**

A meeting of the above was held at the Town Hall on Friday, May 2nd. Dr. Michael A. Casey, chairman, presided. Other members present were: Messrs. T. J. Crotty, P. Casey, E. J. Moloney, J. Ormond, B.E.E. Maher, J. F. Bowen, B. Mulcahy, J. Leo, J. Lanigan, L. A. Veale, N. Kelly, P. J. Morrissey, and An Fear Mor.  
At the outset the Chairman apologized that the Council Chamber was not available for the meeting, but hoped that for any future meetings under the auspices of the Association the Council Chamber would be available.

The minutes of the last meeting were then read, approved and signed by the Chairman.  
Arising out of the minutes the following points were discussed:  
**Salmon Fishing in the Harbour.**—A discussion having taken place, Mr. P. J. Morrissey explained the legal position in this regard and he promised to write to the Department of Industry and Commerce and endeavour to have an inquiry held to have the section of the Act prohibiting salmon fishing in the harbour amended.

**Co-option of New Members.**—On the proposition of the Chairman, seconded by Mr. Crotty, it was unanimously agreed to co-opt Messrs. D. Sheedy, County Surveyor, Michael Kenne, B.E., and An Fear Mor as members of the committee.  
**Oil Fuel Storage Facilities.**—The Chairman referred to the development and expansion of industry in the urban area, pointing out that it was essential that oil fuel storage tanks should be available owing to the very difficult position as regards coal distribution. A number of industries were at the moment considering the change over to oil fuel and no progress could be made in that direction by the industries concerned until fuel storage tanks were available. If sufficient facilities were available industries within a radius of 30 to 40 miles could be supplied through Dungarvan port. Tankers from 250 tons to 500 tons capacity are now available to land oil. He informed the meeting that the Dickens Leather Co., Ltd., had already drawn up a scheme whereby a depot would be installed at the "Look-Out" and covered with a cement platform so that passers by would have to be aware that they were walking on top of tanks. In his view such development would improve the situation of Dungarvan. His company are already in touch with the local authorities in this matter but cannot proceed further with their scheme of development until a decision is reached on this matter.  
It was finally decided that Mr. R. J. Moloney, Mr. P. A. Casey and Mr. E. Maher act as a sub-committee to investigate the matter and report back at the next meeting.

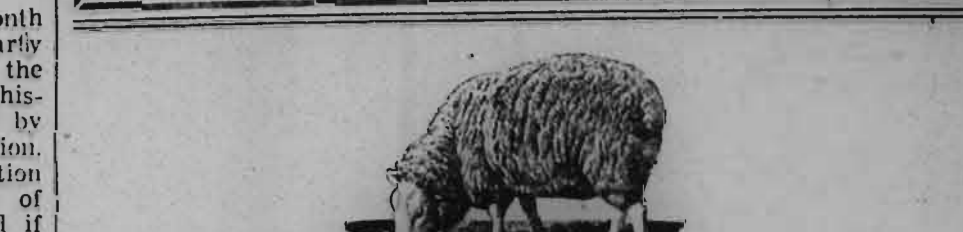
