JUMBLE SALE.

NOTICE TO SHOPKEEPERS Shopkeepers should note that licences to sell tea by wholesale as from the 1st July will be granted only to Wholesale Tea concerns which were carrying on a bona fide business before the 7th June, 1947, from premises within this State. Shopkeepers will not, therefore, be in a position to obtain quotas, as formerly, from external

wholesalers trading from premises outside the State. Shopkeepers who hitherto received supplies of tea from such external wholesalers and who have not yet informed the Department of Industry and Commerce of the name and address of the Irish wholesaler from whom they wish to receive their supplies of tea in future should do so without further delay.

TEA RATIONING

In their own interests, shopkeepers should take care to nominate only a wholesaler who has been carrying on from premises within this State the business of breaking, blending and packing tea for sale by wholesale, and has invoiced the tea from these premises. A shopkeeper who has any doubt as to whether a wholesale supplier complies with these requirements should send an inquiry to the Department of Industry and Commerce, Griffith Barracks, Dublin. Shopkeepers should ignore communications in a contrary sense to this notification issued by or on behalf of any external tea wholesaler trading from premises outside this country.
