CO. WATERFORD COMMITTEE OF AGRICULTURE. Sheep Breeding Scheme 1947.

FOR the purpose of improving the breeds of mountain sheep in Co. Waterford, the Waterford Committee of Agriculture are prepared, subject to the approval of the Department of Agriculture, to locate a limited number of high-grade, black-face rams on the commonage areas of the Comeragh and Knockmadow Mountains on the following conditions—

(1) The Committee shall grant to each selected applicant a premium of from £5 to £8, on the basis that the value of the premium shall be less by £2 than the cost price of the ram, subject to a maximum premium of £8.

(2) In the allocation of rams, preference will be given to applicants who apply on behalf of sheep owners who are prepared to mate the rams to selected ewes.

(3) The Committee will endeavour that only rams of a high standard of quality will be supplied, but they cannot undertake responsibility in case any animal should subsequently prove unfruitful or unsatisfactory for breeding purposes.

(4) Each applicant shall be required to lodge with his application a deposit of £3. Of the amount so lodged one half may be retained by the Committee where a sufficient supply of rams being available, a selected applicant fails to procure a ram.

(5) In all cases of dispute in matters connected with this Scheme, the decision of the Minister for Agriculture shall be final.

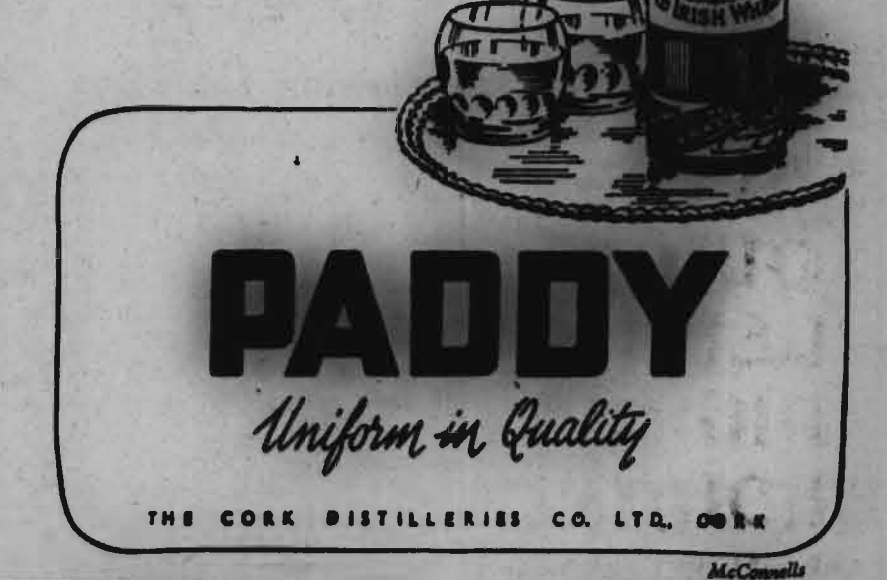

Carroll, solicitor, represented Lismore, representing the public health section of the County Council, said that 133 new houses were being built in Lismore. It was proposed to erect 66 houses on the site proposed to be acquired. In reply to Mr. Carroll, Mr. Flynn said that he had seen (a) the site, (b) the plans, and (c) the site, and that a fair field removed this objection. Dr. O'Farrell, M.O.H., Lismore, said that he had seen the site and recommended the building of 133 new houses.
