Tipperary Man On Attempted Murder Charge

Dungarvan District Court was held on last Tuesday before District Justice E. O. Rialin.

CLAIM FOR PLOUGHING.
Jas. Hennessy, Leagh, Ring, sued Sam Power, Springmount, for £3 9s., for ploughing done in 1946 at defendant's land, at Springmount.

Mr. J. P. Kenny (E. A. Ryan and Co.) for plaintiff. Mr. A. R. Farrell (Messrs. Farrell and Morrissey) for defendant.

Plaintiff, who said he was an agricultural labourer, deposed that he ploughed 5 1/2 acres of a field which defendant had rented from Mr. Dunne at the Spring. No arrangement had been made about the price, but witness charged defendant 12s. an acre (25s. an acre was the full price) as witness had only one horse of his own for the ploughing and the defendant had to get a second horse. Witness worked for defendant before in 1945 and 1946. In 1945 witness cut corn for defendant for which there was a balance of £3 due to witness.

Mr. Kenny—Before you did this ploughing did you make any mention of this to him?
Witness—I did and he paid me for the cutting of the corn but he did not pay me for the ploughing.

Continuing, witness said that he asked defendant about this last April and "what I got was a box in the month."
Cross-examined by Mr. Farrell, witness said he was not struck in the mouth but it looked as if "he might have been."

Mr. Farrell—So you were not struck at all?
Witness—I wasn't.

Further cross-examined, witness said it was usual for the man who did the ploughing to provide the two horses. Witness had only one horse.

Mr. Farrell—Was there any mention by Sam Power that he would keep your horse and feed it?
Witness—There was nothing about it. He had the horse for his own use.

Mr. Farrell—How long had he the horse? About nine days.
If Willie Curran, who gave the other horse, swears that your horse was there for 7 or 8 weeks, that there was not a proper arrangement made for it, it was only there for about nine days.

And that your horse got oats and mangolds paid for by Mr. Power? He had him for his own use.
Witness, in further cross-examination denied that defendant did half the ploughing and that he got £3 for the ploughing. He said that the £3 was the balance due in respect of the cutting of the corn. Witness did other work for the defendant and got paid for it all, except the ploughing on the occasion in question. To a further question by Mr. Farrell, witness said that the defendant promised to leave the money for the ploughing at Mrs. Kirby's but he never did. Witness was quite satisfied at the payments he got from defendant for other work he did for him.

Mr. T. C. Williams (J. F. Williams and Son), who were acting for Messrs. T. Frewin and Son, Tipperary, said he had no questions to ask witness as regards the charge, but would apply for the granting of bail.
Replying to Mr. Williams, witness agreed that Mr. Ryan was a married man, with three children, and had 300 acres of land.
At this time it is very essential for him to be on the land.
Witness—Yes.
Would it not be very difficult for him to get the man to try and escape trial?—Yes.
At this stage Inspector Butler, Tipperary (for the prosecution) said that there was no objection to bail, but because of the gravity of the charge, the bail should be high and also that he give an undertaking not to interfere with the ploughing. He suggested a personal surety of £300 and two other solvent sureties of £50 each.

The Justice said that in view of the charge the £500 bail was small and suggested, and on these being forthcoming, he remanded the accused to the Tipperary Court on August 5th.

ALLEGED MALICIOUS DAMAGE.
In the adjourned case under the Road Transport Act against Jas. Beresford, Clendinning, and Jas. Beresford, Castlequarter, who were charged, with maliciously damaging property at the Model Farm, Dungarvan, by Mr. O'Mahony, the witness for the plaintiff, who was not called, was dismissed.

ADJOURNED ROAD TRANSPORT ACT SUMMONS.
In the adjourned case, under the Road Transport Act against Jas. Beresford, Clendinning, and Jas. Beresford, Castlequarter, who were charged, with maliciously damaging property at the Model Farm, Dungarvan, by Mr. O'Mahony, the witness for the plaintiff, who was not called, was dismissed.

Mr. J. P. Morrissey (Messrs. Farrell and Morrissey) for plaintiff. Mr. J. P. Kenny for defendant.

Mr. T. C. Williams, Solr., for defendant, addressed the court. The facts were as stated by Mr. Williams. In the past, during the time of the Justice's predecessor, the facts were as stated, to adjourn cases, and if there was no complaint in the meantime, to apply the P.O.A. He agreed to Mr. Williams' suggestion for an adjournment.

CHILDREN'S COURT.
A number of young boys and girls from Loughmore and Cathal Brugha Place appeared at the Children's Court, charged with various offences. In the case of one boy, there were three separate charges against him.

Two boys from Loughmore were charged with breaking and entering the licensed premises of Miss E. Power, Wolf Tone Road and stealing cash and goods, on Sunday, December 29th, 1946.

Both pleaded guilty.
Supt. O'Mahoney, outlining the facts of the case, said that on St. Stephen's Day the two defendants called at these premises with the wren. While there one of them was alleged to have seen money in a drawer and he arranged for his companion to go into the house and take the money. On the following Sunday, they approached the house from the rear, hid among some bushes, and shrubs until Miss Power would go to Mass. When she went out, they came to the front of the shop and according to their alleged statements broke a hole in a window and one of them went in and opened the back door for the other and let him in.

The Justice pointed out that the alleged offences had occurred over six months ago and in the circumstances he must apply the P.O.A. It was stated that the money was ready to be paid back. Mr. P. J. Morrissey represented one of the defendants.

One of the boys in the above case was also charged with another young boy from Loughmore with the larceny of money and goods from a shop in Colligan.

Supt. O'Mahoney explained that the shop in question was a lock-up one and the proprietor when finished in it, locked it and took away the key. On this occasion she locked the door but left the key in the lock. When the two defendants were passing by, the shop, the boy charged in the previous case, opened the door and they went in, and he took money which he shared with the other boys. On a second occasion this boy did the same thing and took more money from the shop.

Mr. P. J. Morrissey, who appeared for this boy, said that he was instructed to say that on the first occasion cash and lemonade to the value of 14s. was taken and on the second occasion 12s. was taken from a glass jar.
