NOTICE TO HOUSERGLDERS

1. In order to facilitate the exertion of the utmost effort in saving the grain harvest, the Minister for industry and Corometee has decided to increase the basic domestic ration of bread flour and wheatenmeal for the four weeks commencing on Saturday, 36th August, and ending on Friday, 26th September. The maximum ration for that period will be 8 lbs. of bread or 6 lbs. of flour or wheatenmeal a mark her research.

ration for that period will be 8 lbs. of bread or 6 lbs. of flour or wheatenmeal a week per person.

2. The increased ration will not be granted to consumers resident in the County Borough of Dublin, the Borough of Duin Laoghaire, or the County Boroughs of Cork, Limerick and Waterford. The wheat supply position is excremely uncertain, and a severe strain will be placed on reacurces if the increase in the ration is availed of by a large proportion of the Bopulation. The Minister requests consumers not to ask for the increased ration unless they are actively engaged in connection with harvest operations and are in urgent personal need of extra bread or flour.

3. Consumers who propose to avail themselves of the increase should notify their suppliers without delay, but in any event not later than Saturday, the 23rd August.

4. There will be no increase in rations of confectionery, in supplementary allowances granted to heavy workers, or in the quantity of flour, wheatenmeal or bread purchased under any special permit (e.g., Institutions, Catering Establishments).
