Dungarvan Defeat Kilgobinet.

GAME OF VERY LITTLE THRILLS OR EXCITEMENT.

At the Gaelic Field, Dungarvan, on Sunday, Dungarvan defeated Kilgobinet in the Junior Football Final by 6 points.

It was a game of very little thrills or excitement. The home town boys were continuously attacking but never got very far owing to the determined defence of the Kilgobinet players.

At full time the score stood as above. THE GAME.

Dungarvan made the break away and fought their way towards the Kilgobinet goalmouth but were blocked by the defence line and forced back. Play in this manner was kept up for a considerable time, and after a desperate struggle outside the Dungarvan goalmouth Kilgobinet had a goal.

DUNGARVAN COURT

The Dungarvan District Court was held on last Tuesday before District Justice O. Blain.

PUBLICANS' LICENCES. There being no objection, the renewal of publicans' licenses in the area was granted in every case.

LICENCES CONFIRMED. Messrs. Farrell and Morrissey, on behalf of Mr. E. Mather, were granted confirmation of the ad interim transfer of the licence in respect of Lawlor's Hotel, Ltd.

Mr. T. C. Williams (J. F. Williams and Sons) was granted on behalf of Mr. N. Casey confirmation of the ad interim transfer of the licence in respect of the licensed premises at 19 Graffan Square.

A similar application on behalf of Mr. James Hayes in respect of the licensed premises at Main Street was also granted.

RESTAURANT LICENCE. Mr. T. C. Williams, on behalf of Mrs. Mary Egan, was granted a renewal of the restaurant certificate in respect of Egan's Hotel, O'Connell Street.

DANCE LICENCES. Mr. C. Williams, solicitor, was on behalf of Mr. P. F. Gynon, granted a renewal of the dance licence in respect of the Dungarvan Golf Club on the same terms as last year.

Mr. J. F. Kenny (E. A. Ryan and Co.) was granted on behalf of James O'Connell, a renewal of the dance licence on the same terms as last year in respect of the Pike Amusement Hall.

Mr. C. Williams, on behalf of Mrs. N. Monahan, Ocean View Hotel, Clonane, was granted a renewal of the dance licence for ball attached to the hotel on the same terms as last year. An extension of the licensing hours in respect of the hotel was granted for September 24th from 12.30 a.m. to 4 a.m. on the occasion of a dance.

Mr. Williams made the application. GAME DEALER'S LICENCE. Mr. P. Mackey, O'Connell Street, was granted a game dealer's licence. Messrs. Farrell and Morrissey made the application.

UNLICENSED BULL. A farmer from the Ballinamult area was prosecuted by the Minister for Agriculture for keeping an unlicensed bull.

Dr. R. Cunnihan, State Solicitor, prosecuted Mr. T. C. Williams for defendant, pleaded guilty.

An Inspector under the Livestock Breeding Act gave evidence of calling at the defendant's house, but he was not present at the time.

To Mr. Williams, witness said that the defendant's bull was a cross between a bull and a cow.

Mr. Williams, pleading for his client, pointed out that his client had wintered a bull, 4 cattle and 52 sheep.

A fine of 10s. was imposed and £2 expenses allowed.

There was a similar prosecution against a farmer from Clonane who was for trespass at the rear of the building where the defendant had put timber. The plaintiff was the owner of a fairly large house known as Old Cappagh House, and submitted a portion of it on the west side to the defendant on foot of a written agreement dated September 1945, whereby the weekly rent of 3s. a week, payable monthly. The agreement was fixed for only six months. Mr. Farrell then went on to say that the defendant continued to use a plot of ground near the house which was not in the agreement, with the result that in February of this year Mr. Kieley had two civil bills for trespass against him in the Circuit Court and also an application to have the rent fixed under the 1946 Act. Judge Sealy held that the defendant was not entitled to the plot and gave a small decree for damages and fixed the rent at 10s. a week. After the court Mr. Kieley voluntarily gave a small portion of ground to the defendant in the yard. This was pulled off by the defendant and put timber beyond this plot, which was an obstruction to plaintiff. If the timber was put inside the railing there would be no trouble.

Mr. Williams said the case was one of confusion. What was the order that Judge Sealy made at the last court? That was the point at issue. There were two actions brought by the plaintiff, one of which was for damages. His (Mr. Williams) client says that Judge Sealy made an order that he was to get a plot 30 feet long, while Mr. Farrell states that it was 19 feet.

The Justice said that if Mr. Williams wanted to have the Circuit Judge's order amended he (Justice) was prepared to adjourn the case until such time as the amended order was made.

Mr. Farrell said he would resist that.

The Justice said Mr. Williams was entitled to apply for the terms of the Circuit Judge's order. If Mr. Williams was prepared to go back to Judge Sealy to have the position clarified he (Justice) was prepared to do the proceedings until then.

Following some further observations by both solicitors on the case, the Justice said he would rise for ten minutes to see if a settlement could be arrived at.

On the resumption of the court it was announced that both parties had agreed a fenced-in plot 27 feet by 19 feet at a weekly rent of 10s.

The Justice said he would adjourn the case for a month in order to have the agreement properly drawn up and executed.

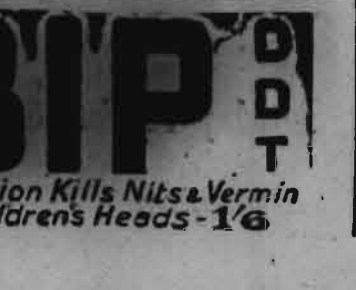
