

# FUEL RATIONING

NOTICE TO DOMESTIC CONSUMERS QUTSIDE THE SCHEDULED TURF AREA

1. A new system of fuel rationing in the non-turf area will come into operation from 1st October, 1947, which is designed to secure more equitable distribution than in the past. The boundaries of the turf area and the non-turf area are now well known, and there is no change in this respect. The salient features of the revised system are set out hereunder.

PURCHASES AND COUPONS:

2. From 1st October, 1947, onwards, it will not be legal—except under permit—to purchase coal or turf in the non-turf area, or coal, turf or firewood in the firewood area without surrendering coupons.

3. A Fuel Ration Book consisting of 5 sheets of coupons, lettered AA to EE, has already been issued to the head of every household in the non-ture area.

4. The next Ration Period for domestic fuel will be from 1st October, 1947, to 30th November, 1947,

AMOUNT OF RATION AND APPROPRIATE COUPONS: AMOUNT OF RATION AND APPROPRIATE COUPGNS:

5. The ration for the October/November period will be:

(a) In the area in which firewood is rationed (i.e., the County Boroughs of Cork (and certain areas in the immediate vicinity of Cork), Dublin and Waterford, the Boroughs of Dun Laoghaire, Drogheda, Kilkenny and Wexford, the Urban Districts of Arklow, Bray, Dundalk, Dungarvan, Enniscorthy, New Ross and Wicklow, one-quarter of a ton of coal together with one-half of a ton of turi or firewood, or one-half of a ton of turi and firewood combined;

(b) In the remainder of the hon-turi area, one-quarter of a ton of coal and one-half of a ton of turi.

HOW TO USE COUPONS:
7. Each coupon lettered AA will be exchangeable for 2 stones of coal, the full sheet of 20 AA coupons being exchangeable for one-

quarter of a ton of coal.

8. In the firewood area each coupon lettered BB will be exchangeable for 4 stones of turf or firewood or 4 stones of turf and firewood combined, the full page of 20 BB coupons being exchangeable for one-half of a ton of turf or firewood or one-half of a ton of turf and firewood combined. In the remainder of the non-turf area these coupons will be interchangeable for turf only, as firewood is not rationed outside the firewood area.

9. The coupons other than those lettered AA and BB may be used in the October/Nevember ration period. The remaining coupons will be required for use in subsequent ration periods and should not, in any circumstances, be removed from the Fuel Ration Book until further notice. A householder who disregards this warning may be unable to obtain Fuel in a subsequent period.

10. As from 1st October, 1947, it will not be necessary for a householder to be registered with any particular merchant.

holder to be registered with any particular merchant.

11. Before purchasing fuel, the head of the household must write his name and address clearly on the front of the Fuel Ration Book. The book must be handed to the licensed fuel merchant at the time of purchase; he will cut out the correct number of coupons and

return the book.

12. It is illegal to buy or sell fuel coupons, to give or take presents position that where a ration is not actually delivered within the relevant ration period, it cannot be carried forward to a subsequent

relevant vation period, it cannot be carried forward to a subsequent period. The reason for non-delivery is immaterial and, in particular, it is not sufficient that the coupons should have been surrendered to the fuel merchant within the ration period to which they relate.

14. Domestic consumers who have produced their own fuel supplies are requested, in the national interest, not to draw their ration unless they really need the additional fuel. They have already performed a national service and will not wish to detract from its value. Persons who do not propose to use the October/November coupons should detach the relative pages from the licence and return them to the Department of Industry and Commerce.

NOTICE TO LICENSED FUEL MERCHANTS. 16. From 1st October, 1447, onwards, coat or turf may not be sold in the non-turf area for domestic use, nor may firewood be sold in the firewood area otherwise than in exchange for fuel coupons or on foot of a permit or other authority issued by the Minister for Industry and Commerce. The coupons must be walld in respect of the type of fuel concerned and for the ration period in which the fuel is concerned.

17. Traders may not supply coal, turf or firewood to other traders after hat October, 1947, without obtaining the appropriate number of valid coupons unless so authorised by the Minister for Industry and Commerce by permit or otherwise.

18. Coupons marked "AA" and "BB" must not be accepted from householders after 30th November, 1947. These coupons should not be taken unless there is a reasonable probability that the fuel will be delivered on or before 30th November. It will be illegal to deliver fuel after 30th November in respect of coupons which are valid only for the ration period then ending.

19. Coupons marked "AA" and "BB" which are in the hands of traders at 30th November—and in respect of which deliveries of fuel have been made on or before that date—can be exchanged for further supplies of fuel up to 31st December, 1947. On no account may coupons in respect of which fuel deliveries have not been made to consumers be used in exchange for further supplies of fuel.

20. Licensed fuel merchants must keep such records as are prescribed by Emergency Powers (Control of Fuel) Order, 1941 (as amended), to enable them satisfactorily to account for all rationed fuel handled. These records must be kept up-to-date and be available for inspection by the Department's officers on demand.

21. If unit is sold in a bag, the bag must contain not less than 4 stones of turf.
