Winter Wheat

FARMERS ARE AWARE of the advantages which winter wheat, sown under favourable soil and weather conditions, possesses over spring varieties. Unfortunately, a series of unfavourable sowing seasons has caused the gradual substitution of spring for winter varieties and led to corresponding difficulties in getting the crop sown in the limited spring period.

Unfortunately, owing to the decline in the area sown under winter wheat, seed of winter varieties is exceedingly scarce, and seed assemblers have not been able to procure their full requirements. The quantity of imported seed wheat which is likely to be available will not be at all sufficient to meet requirements and some time must clapse before delivery of this wheat can

It is believed that there is a fair quantity of sound winter wheat available in the country which normally would be sold for milling purposes. Farmers who have such wheat are earnestly requested to offer it for seed purposes either to seed assemblers or direct to other growers. If they have any difficulty in so disposing of it, it is suggested that they should communicate with their Agricultural Enstructor or with the local Tillage

The main thing to remember is that the sowing of winter wheat is imperative; and that every bushel of grain suitable for seed will be required. Farmers who have suitable seed from their own crops or who can procure suitable seed from other growers would do well to sow their seed while present favourable conditions obtain rather than incur delay in waiting for imported
