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NEED FOR EXTENSION OF INDUSTRY

Mr. Lemass at Youghal

THE extension of industry was the key to many of their most pressing problems, being of even greater importance now than before the war...

The predominant importance of agriculture in their economic system was not questioned, but without manufacturing to supplement it as an independent economic existence...

The factories which an Taniste set in motion were Wool Combers (Ireland) Ltd., Midleton; Worsted Mills, Ltd., Midleton; Seafield Fabrics Ltd., Youghal. These three factories are under the chairmanship of the well-known Cork industrialist, Mr. William Dwyer...

Wednesday's ceremonies began with the blessing of the factories, His Lordship, Most Rev. Dr. Roche, Bishop of Cloyne, assisted by Rt. Rev. Mr. O'Connell, P.P., Midleton, Dean of Cloyne, and by Rev. T. F. Murphy, Bishop's Secretary...

Minister's Address. Mr. Lemass said that the extension of industry was the key of many of our most pressing problems, economic and social. Its importance was even greater now than before the war...

Anybody who wished to understand the nature of the economic problems, with which this country has now to contend must take as his starting point the basic fact that this year imports were running at ninety million pounds...

That relatively large deficit was a danger signal which could not be ignored. How could we get other countries to send us ninety million pounds of goods when we only gave them thirty million pounds back?

The answer to that question was, first, that we had other exports to supplement our physical exports, goods which could help to close the gap...

The long-term solution of that problem was increased production for home and for export; increased production in agriculture and manufacturing industry.

The important factor in obtaining an economic point of view, although there were social and security reasons which made agriculture more important...

"It is possible," he said "by our own efforts to get out of it. We have been assured of the good will of the British authorities in obtaining plant and industrial materials in increasing quantities from British sources...

If the dollars for the purchase of such equipment could not be made available from current dollar earnings, then we are prepared to consider resort to the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development...

Our economic progress must drive us to a stop. We got it started after the war despite all the difficulties, and already much has been done. But very much more is planned and waiting to start...

Our capital assets were sterling assets. They could be used only to buy from countries which were willing to accept sterling in payment. They cannot now be freely converted into other currencies, such as dollars...

The recent negotiations with the British Government had one eminently satisfactory feature, which does not appear in the detailed arrangements already announced.

There is now no question in the minds of our British neighbours that the maximum development of Irish resources and potentialities is in any way detrimental to British commercial interests.

The bad old idea that one nation's industrial progress must necessarily mean another nation's loss, is gone. That idea was born of the prolonged economic depression between the wars and of the illusion that a country could escape the consequences of a widespread international slump...

The new factories we inspected would bring joy to the heart of anybody who is responsible for industry and commerce, not primarily because of the appearance of the factories nor the happy workers in them, but through the knowledge of the courage that overcame all difficulties encountered.

The industries with which Mr. William Dwyer is associated are not merely models of efficiency but they are models of enterprise and initiative in the future of Ireland which is an encouragement to everybody.
