NOTICE TO DOMESTIC CONSUMERS AND SHOPKEEPERS.

A new ration period for domestic consumers commences on Saturday next, 29th November, 1947. THE PAGE OF THE GENERAL RATION BOOK APPLICABLE TO TEA FOR THE RATION PERIOD NOW EXPIRING, 1947. LETTERED "L"), WILL CONTINUE TO BE THE APPRO-PRIATE REGISTRATION DOCUMENT FOR THE PURPOSE OF OBTAINING DOMESTIC TEA RATIONS DURING THE NEW RATION PERIOD AND FRESH REGISTRATION WILL NOT BE

NECESSARY IN RESPECT OF THIS COMMODITY.

New pages of the General Ration Book have been prescribed for sugar and butter and all persons must renew registration with their suppliers for these commodities so that they may be able to continue to draw rations as from Saturday next, 29th November. The new

pages are:
PAGE 36 (COUPONS LETTERED "O") FOR SUGAR.
PAGE 37 (COUPONS LETTERED "P") FOR BUTTER.

Registration may be renewed in the usual manner by completing the top portions of Pages 36 and 37 and lodging the ration books with the shopkeeper concerned not later than 29th November, 1947. The shopkeeper will retain the pages and, having acknowledged their receipt on the inside of the covers of the ration books, will return the books. Domestic consumers are advised to register at the shops from which they are at present receiving their supplies.

Shopkeepers must accept the application for re-registration of every person at present registered with them. As from 29th November, 1947, shopkeepers may not sell sugar or butter at any shop to any person who has not re-registered by lodging the new pages of the General Ration Book as prescribed above. They may continue to supply the appropriate tea rations to customers who have previously registered by lodging Page 33 (coupons lettered "L" of the General Ration Book.
