

That statement is incorrect and altogether misleading, and it is with the object of letting the public know the real position that we ask you to publish this reply to the statements made at the U.D.C. meeting.

The main issue at the root of the trouble is the margin between the price paid to the registered producers and the retail price. It must be remembered that the problem arises out of the supply in winter time only as the majority of the re-tailers can produce sufficient milk from their own herds in the summer to meet their individual demands. Only in the winter when milk production decreases are they obliged to look for a supplemental supply from registered producers who do not normally supply milk for retail purposes.

The position as it stands at the moment is that registered milk producers are willing to supply the re-

As an example and to prove this point we put forward the case of a retailer who normally delivers 100 gallons of milk per day. He either purchased or produces that milk at, say, 2s. a gallon (the price presently paid to producers by the retailers), and if he salls it at 2s fed his bulk

As the retailers refuse to sell the milk at 2s. 6d. per gallon, which they could very well afford to do, we find them going to all sorts of places looking for milk a few pence a gallon cheaper to supplement their supply while there are nearly 100 gallons per day being turned into the creamery by local tegistered milk producers who could gladly supply the retailers if there was a proper
