

is from local "Registered Milk Producers/" we, the undersigned, who are both registered milk producers and retailers, take the liberty of re-Memorial to Revered Parish Friest.

Milk Producers" letter is to the effect that we, the retailers, are charging exorbitant prices and that the price of milk at present is due solely to the price charged by us. We are charging the controlled price as fixed by the Government, which is 2/8 per gallon.

The producers held a meeting on the 13th November last and decided to demand 2/4 per gallon delivered and issued an ultimatum that if the amount was not paid they would cease supplying. They gave 24 hours notice, and were it not for the fact that other dairy farmers in the locality obliged us with milk the town would be without a certain proportion of its normal supply. They cased supplying the milk and have not since supplied it to us as we refused to pay their demand of 2/2 per gallon for milk collected from them and 2/4 per gallon for milk delivered.

The producers letter is to the effect that we, the retailers, are charging to the respect that the price of milk elected at the passing, and the sympathy felt for her bereaved husband and relatives.
