## NOTICE TO HOUSEHOLDERS

"V" coupons, from page 43 of the general ration book, will not be valid on and from the 17th January and may not be accepted by traders in exchange for flour confectionery or wheatenmeal. "W" coupons from page 44 of the general ration book are those to be used from that date for casual purchases of flour confectionery or wheatenmeal. Each coupon authorises the purchase of 1 lb. of either commodity, and may be presented at any time up to the 16th July, 1948. The necessary Order, entitled the Flour and Bread (Rationing) Order, 1946 (Supplemental Provisions) (No. 4) Order, 1947, has been made by the Minister for Industry and Commerce, and copies may be obtained from the Government Publications Sales Office, 3-4 College Street, Dublin, or through any bookseller.

Householders should see that they receive from their bread suppliers a new Householders' Bread Ration Card for the recording of purchases in the period commencing on the 17th January. The general flour and bread rationing arrangements remain
