IRISH BAKERS' UNION. (Dungarvan Branch).

LATE MR. WILLIAM GIBBONS.

A general meeting of the Dungarvan branch of the Irish Bakers' Union was held at the Town Hall on Wednesday night, March 10th. Mr. Jas. O'Gorman, Junr., Vice-Chairman, presided. The officers present were—Messrs. John Greaney, E. O'Gorman, Matt Duggan, M. Upton, M. Gambon, W. Towler, Denis Clancy, P. Duggan, Senr., P. Buckley, M. Walsh, Michael Duggan, Michael Clancy, Junior; Thos. Whelan and David Condon, Secretary.

The Chairman said he had a sad duty to perform that night, because by the death of their late Chairman, William Gibbons, the branch had suffered an irreparable loss—and although as their Vice-Chairman he was sitting in the late Chairman's place, he did not consider that he would ever reach the high standard set up. "I have known," continued the Chairman, "the late William Gibbons for a good many years and I need not tell you what a fine friend and loyal colleague he was. You know that with the Secretary (D. Condon) he founded this branch about 30 years ago and that the Secretary, himself, and the other pioneers, Michael Clancy, Senr.; John Greaney, Jas. O'Gorman, Senr.; and the late Patsy Kieley and Thomas Greaney, kept the branch going and it was illegal to do so in the days of the British Military and Black and Tans."

The Chairman then proposed the following resolution of sympathy:—"That we, the members of the Dungarvan Branch of the Irish Bakers' Union, extend our deepest sympathy to Edward Gibbons and Mrs. B. Kieley, her husband and family, on the death of William Gibbons, our branch chairman."

Mr. John Greaney, on seconding the resolution, said the late Chairman and himself were life-long friends and he very much regretted his early death.

Mr. D. Condon, Secretary, said no words of his could adequately express his feelings, as his heart was too full of sorrow at the passing of his great friend and colleague, the late Chairman. Taking up the Secretaryship of the branch in January, 1918, he could be said to have not only served his apprenticeship to the Trade Union movement but to have graduated under the Chairmanship of his esteemed colleague, William Gibbons. Having been closely associated with him during the past 30 years in the running of this branch, there was no one present in a better position to speak of his honesty, his sincerity and his loyalty.

Continuing, the Secretary said:—"No one understood the real Willie Gibbons better than I did. I enjoyed his friendship, his confidence and his full unselfish co-operation during all these years, and the fact that our branch can boast of an unbroken record of 30 years in the Trade Union movement is due to one man, and one man only, the late William Gibbons. I know the members of this branch admired and respected him, and I can recall one or two stormy meetings in this branch on which he pointed the way to the waters and the members listened to him, looked up to him, and accepted his ruling, because they had the utmost confidence in him, and knew there was a fair crack of the whip for everyone. The death of William Gibbons is a great loss to this branch, but his passing is a personal loss to me as it leaves a void in my life that can never be filled."

Mr. Jack McHugh, Manager, K. Williams & Co., said—"Mr. Chairman and friends, like you secretary, my heart is full of sorrow to-night at the passing of such a grand and unassuming character as William Gibbons. The firm of K. Williams & Co. is all the poorer by his death. William Gibbons came to K. Williams & Co. as an apprentice to the bakery trade over 45 years ago and continued ever since in the employ of the firm until his health failed him last October. I knew William Gibbons' sterling qualities and charitable disposition, and although I did not presume to know much about the bakery trade, I knew that the running of that end of the business was quite safe in the hands and under the management of Willie Gibbons."

Mr. McHugh also said that he had been instructed by his directors to make arrangements with Canon O'Brien to have a public Mass offered some Sunday noon for the repose of William Gibbons' soul and he hoped to see all the members of the Dungarvan Branch as well as the Staff at K. Williams & Co. present.

Mr. McHugh asked to have the sympathy of his directors, the staff and workers of the firm of K. Williams & Co. conveyed to the relatives of William Gibbons.

The resolution was then put to the meeting and passed in silence, all present standing.

LISMORE NOTES

Late Mrs. Johanna O'Regan (nee Whelan).—A deep gloom was cast over the entire district by the death of Mrs. Johanna (Lassie) O'Regan, late of 2 Nelson's Terrace, Lower Road, Cork, which sad event occurred at the Bon Secour Hospital, Cork, on Wednesday, March 10th, following a brief illness and at a comparatively early age, and deep and genuine sympathy has been extended to her grief-stricken family circle in their great sorrow. Eldest daughter of Mrs. Laura Whelan and the late Mr. John Whelan, Mayfield, Lismore, and niece of the late Very Rev. Fr. J. O'Shea, P.P., Ballyporeen, the deceased lady had been resident in Cork since her marriage almost 20 years ago with Mr. Maurice O'Regan, also a member of an esteemed Lismore family. Of a deeply religious disposition, the late Mrs. O'Regan possessed many admirable qualities which endeared her to all with whom she came in contact. A deep love of everything National and Gaelic characterised her life, and in her early days she was actively associated with the fight for Irish freedom. She was Secretary of the local Cumann na mBan and also Treasurer of the local branch of the Gaelic League in the pre-Treaty and Free State regime, and in 1945 was awarded the military medal with bar in recognition of her services with the I.R.A. While taking no further part in politics after 1926, she adhered to the principles for which Cathal Bruzha and Tee. McSweeney died, and remained to the end an Irishwoman of whom her country might well be proud. To her bereaved husband, sons and daughter we join their legions of friends in tendering heartfelt sympathy in the loss of a kind, devoted and exemplary Catholic wife and mother. The remains arrived in Lismore from Cork on Thursday evening, 11th inst., and was accompanied to St. Carthage's Church by an extremely large and representative gathering of the general public. Requiem Mass for the happy repose of the departed soul was offered up on Friday morning and the interment was subsequently made in the County Council Cemetery in the presence of another vast assembly of relatives, friends and sympathisers, Rev. Fr. Ahearn, C.C., Lismore, officiated at the obsequies.

LISMORE CASE IN HIGH COURT.

FRANCIS HICKEY v. JOHN SCOTT-ALLEN.

A settlement in the above action was announced in the High Court on Friday, 12th inst., before Mr. Justice Kingsmill-Moore. In continuing the case to the Court, Mr. Justice Kingsmill-Moore, outside Lismore on 13th January, 1947, the boy's head came violently in contact with the door handle of the car and the force of the impact was such that the point of the handle was deeply imbedded in the boy's skull and wrenched completely off the door of the car. The boy was brought to the Dungarvan District Hospital, where he was successfully treated by Dr. McCarthy, and after a very hard and dangerous illness was now out of serious danger, but would suffer the consequences of his brain injury for the rest of his life. Mr. McGuire had an affidavit of Dr. McCarthy, Dungarvan, setting out the facts concerning the injury and an affidavit of Patk. Hickey, father of the boy, setting out the circumstances of the accident and the present condition of the boy. Mr. McGuire explained to the Judge that the great difficulty in the case was to establish any negligence on the part of the driver of the motor car, and in view of this difficulty he had been obliged to advise the father of the child to accept a sum of £350 as compensation together with a sum for costs. If the issue of negligence was clear, Mr. McGuire felt that the boy would have been entitled to much higher damages, but unfortunately this was not so and it would have been too dangerous to the boy's interests to contest the case.

Mr. Justice Kingsmill-Moore, having considered the facts, said he was quite satisfied in the circumstances that the settlement was a fair one, and he agreed with Mr. McGuire that in the case of children involved in an accident of this nature it was often very difficult to establish any negligence on the part of the driver of the car or to avoid contributory negligence on the part of the child of even so tender years. He, therefore, made the James I. McGuire, S.C. with Mr. Gerard Clarke, B.L., were instructed by Messrs. Farrell and Morrissey, Solrs., Dungarvan. Defendant was represented by Messrs. James O'Connor and Co. Solrs., Dublin.
