I Coursed And Tracked

THE news that mid-week racing in England is likely to be resumed in the near future is very welcome to Irish breeders and owners. Useful dogs are sure of a ready market. Owing to racing being confined to Saturday all English tracks cut down the number of dogs at their racing kennels with the result there was very little demand for the average track rider. The Easter Cup at Shelbourne will be run during the present month and should be a great attraction. As there is no scarcity of good class dogs on the Dublin tracks, in fact the times there at the moment are extra good for this time of the year. Of course county owners should bear in mind that the Dublin tracks are much faster than most provincial tracks. This is mainly due to the almost continual resodding of bends, proper banking, and during the winter months the tracks are covered with a thick coat of hops which promotes a quick growth of grass in the early spring and prevents the sod from breaking up too easily. Hops can be got from most breweries for the taking away and are invaluable for the proper treatment of greyhound tracks, particularly in dry weather. A little more care and attention to a racing track's surface saves a lot of trouble to owners. How often during dry weather do we hear of broken toes, and up and down running of the most genuine dogs are due to a badly kept

surface. There should be no excuse for this as sods are easily got and considering the city tracks can buy them by the hundred yards, surely the county tracks can do the same.
THE racing at Waterford on Saturday night was mostly confined to moderate class dogs and although the night was bitter cold, a good crowd turned up. Mr. P. Healy's "Hospital Nurse" was useful and won a good race despite a very bad break. At one time "Erica's Aegle" was fully ten lengths in front but did not stay on and is one to note and will pay to follow. Another three for your note book are "Lotty's Leader," "Captain Gladston" and "Toureen Welcome." Another useful newcomer is Mr. George Higgins' "High Spree." This dog is well bred, by Lone Seal—Red Border and with more experience will be doing under 31.00. It was a bad night for punters as a few well-backed favourites were beaten, particularly the Westford dog, "Lowland Bogle." This was a very useful coursing dog last season and with more experience will win races. During the present season I intend to give a few to follow each week and am hoping to spot a few winners for my readers. It is not easy to sum up the merits of young dogs after one outing as a run or two under the lights may not be the difference. So it is a better betting proposition to support the dogs with experience until we get daylight running after 18th April.

DUNGARVAN POINT-TO-POINT RACES

SPLENDID SPORT WITNESSED BY BIG CROWD.

An outstanding success was the unanimous verdict of the big crowd that attended the annual Dungarvan Point-to-Point meeting at Killosera on last Monday. Favoured with fine weather and with fields well up to average, it was indeed a variable and thrilling race. The order, and close and exciting finishes in three of the events kept the crowd on the tip of its toes with excitement. As usual, this splendid course was in the peak of condition and left nothing to be desired.

For the first race—Open Light-weight race—there were six starters, viz.—Banaganna, Glen Rover, St. Fan, Hastly Call, Little Sunset and The Young Grey. Glen Rover was an early casualty, falling at the boundary fence in the first circuit of the course. The rider, Mr. G. Slack, was injured and was later removed to Dungarvan Hospital, suffering from concussion. At the end of the first circuit the Young Grey, Little Sunset and St. Fan were all well in the picture, while Banaganna and Hastly Call brought up the rear. The second round of the course brought the latter two down, leaving the Young Grey, St. Fan and Little Sunset to fight out the race. Coming into the straight, after the last jump, The Young Grey and St. Fan were neck and neck, with Little Sunset well tailed off. On the rise, The Young Grey went slightly ahead, with St. Fan still challenging, but failed to overtake the former, who won by a length.

Another field of six was the order in the Open Maiden Race, with the issue looking very open. There did not seem to be much in it after the horses had completed the first circuit, but half-way through the "second-time round," the indications were that Dragonfly would come out best. This proved correct, and Mr. Maxwell's horse won easily from Misty Boy and Persil.

The Open Farmers' Race proved another "hard-luck" race, when Peter fell in the run-in when strong young challenger, Flying Doll, was the winner. There were six starters in this event; also.
Much of the local interest was naturally centred in the Dungarvan Harriers' event, in which there were six declarations. They were—Mr. Peter Quail's Coolagh Champion, Mr. J. F. Kenny's Suirum, Mr. T. Rodger, Mr. P. O'Donnell's Light Hand, and Mr. P. Hickey's White Sock. There were no surprises after the first round of the course, but when the field re-appeared half-way in the second round it had been thinned out, with Suirum and Ballycoe well ahead. An exciting duel took place at both horses leaving the last fence behind them faced for home. A hundred yards from the post it looked anyone's race, with both horses battling out the issue. At one moment it looked as if Ballycoe would get there, but Suirum held on grimly to his short lead and got past the post with a length to spare. This is Mr. Kenny's second successive victory, as he won this event again last year.
The last race, Killosera Open Race, saw Mrs. Crosbie, who spoiled The Young Grey, winner of the first race, complete the double by taking the honours in this event also. It was also a double for Mr. T. Cheasty, who rode the winner on both occasions.
