At the monthly meeting of the Waterford Board of Assistance at Dungarvan on Monday, the Minister for Social Welfare, Mr. Norton, was asked by resolution to withdraw his circular...

The resolution was carried on a majority vote of five to two. The decision was taken following consideration of the Minister's letter, which is as follows:—

The Minister appreciates that, in the event of the discontinuance of food vouchers, public assistance authorities will find it necessary, in many cases, to increase the amount of home assistance paid in cash.

The Minister considers it desirable that public assistance authorities should understand at this stage that it is not his intention to ask an Dail to provide further moneys for this service in respect of any succeeding year.

Applications for recoupment in respect of expenditure incurred on the provision of cash allowances in lieu of food vouchers should be made monthly on forms as issued by the Secretary of the Board.

Housing (Amendment) Act, 1948.

ATTENTION is directed to Sections 7 and 8 of the above Act. Section 7 provides that a Housing Authority may, as they think fit, grant or refuse permission to a person to demolish in whole or in part or use otherwise than as a dwelling house any habitable house.
