SEMI-FINALS.
The first of the semi-finals took place at the barracks on Sunday between Willie Hosey and Joe Dalton. The play was very dull and Hosey was very much off form. After some tireless play Dalton succeeded in annexing the first two games on the scores: 21-15, 21-16.

On his return from his successful six months tour of the U.S.A., Mr. Frank Ryan, Ireland's leading tenor, had a public reception given him which will be long remembered in his native town and county, as the spontaneity of the welcome on the occasion will live in the memory of all those who had the good fortune to share in the pleasure of extending such a welcome to a fellow-Irishman not alone known in musical circles but in many other spheres as well. A further tribute was paid to Mr. Ryan recently when he was presented at the local Temperance Hall by Very Rev. Fr. M. Heame, P.P., with a beautiful framed illuminated address on behalf of a large number of clubs representative of all sections of the community, including sporting, Gaelic, musical and other spheres. In presenting the address the Rev. Chairman conveyed the best wishes of all concerned to Mr. Ryan for his future success at home and abroad and expressed the hope that the land of his birth would always hold proud place in his memory.

In expressing his appreciation of the honour conferred on him by his many friends in presenting him with this beautiful address, which he would dearly cherish for the remaining day of his life, Mr. Ryan requested Very Rev. Fr. Heame to have conveyed through the Chairman, Hon. Sec., and other members of the Organising Committee the best thanks of both Mrs. Ryan and himself for the honour conferred on them in this memorable occasion.

Draft copy of address of welcome to Mr. Frank Ryan on the occasion of his return home from the U.S.A.:

Dear Mr. Ryan—We, your friends and fellow-townsmen of Talrow, consider that on this occasion, your homecoming from America, after such a brilliant and successful concert tour, which has cast lustre, not only on you from across the ocean, but should be presented with an address of public welcome. We know from reports of your concerts which have been given in various parts of the American people, but in particular the hearts of the Irish exiles and the descendants of the early emigrants by the magic of your golden voice. Talrow is not the least amongst the towns of Ireland remarkable for their illustrious sons. We recall Tobias Kirby, Archbishop of Ephesus, the friend of Pope Pius the 9th; John Hogan, the famous sculptor, as well known in Italy, too, as in Talrow; Dr. Henry Kenney, one of the distinguished Chicago Surgeons, and you, too, must be included in the list of Talrow's immortals, whose genius and talents have gained for you the highest reputation and has brought glory and pride to their native town by the rippling Bride. We know how generous you are at all times in helping the Church and charity, as well as the National cause, through the medium of your great gift of song, not only on the radio, but here at home, and it is not because we know you so well and meet you almost daily that we should show you on your return from such a triumphant visit to America how proud of you we are and how glad we are to welcome you home. AN EXTREMELY SAD DEMISE.
The news of the death of Mr. Wm. Walsh, farmer, Comeragh Kilrossanty, son of Mrs. and the late Mr. Michael Walsh, do, which took place at Maypark Nursing Home, Waterford, on Tuesday evening, has evoked feelings of profound sorrow throughout these parts. The fact that the deceased was only a few weeks married renders the demise all the more poignant to his nearest and dearest. It would appear that, shortly after returning from the honeymoon, he contracted a cold which later developed into pneumonia, but despite the best medical care and nursing, the Great Cal came quickly, and when it did come he answered it uncomplainingly and with a resignation to God's Holy Will, which was characteristic of his whole life. His passing in the prime of manhood has come as a painful shock to the members of a most extensive friendship circle, who admired and respected his strength and industry, and his self-stricken widow and mother and father, including the Rev. J. Walsh, C.C., Carrickbeg, a great wave of sympathy goes out in their heavy sorrow. Persons in Lodgings.—Arising from the Manager's orders regarding sending into the Clerk the names of persons in lodgings, the Chairman said that the order was married couples with or without families. He (Chairman) made the suggestion about the married couples and it was Senator Butler who suggested married couples with families also. The Chairman then went on to give his estimate of the number in lodgings, and said he would bet that it would be about 30.

Mr. Veale—It's more than that. Mr. Veale said he had made out a list of people in lodgings in Dungarvan and Abbotside.

Chairman—I left out Abbotside. I am prepared to make a list. I would not be able to get 30—I mean married people.

Mr. Veale said the total on his list was 62, and he said that there was quite a big number in addition to that living in bad houses, who wanted to get out of them.

Mr. Kyne—I am sure you would get over 100.

Chairman—I must be very stupid so. I go into nearly every street in Dungarvan in my job and I hold that it is not that much at all.

Mr. Veale—I am definite that there are 63 living in lodgings and I'm sure there is more than that. I do not ask people what they have any objection to going to Abbotside and they said they would fly over to it.

Mr. Clancy said he objected to this attitude, going around influencing people. They (members) were there to do their duty and there should be no subterfuge like this about it. There was a lot of humbug about this Dungarvan and Abbotside talk. They must have regard to the amenities.

In Dungarvan they had four secondary schools, two churches, two chapels; they had people working in factories. And these must be considered. They heard about "we like Abbotside and we don't like Abbey side."

He did not like that kind of talk at all. In the Abbotside scheme they would never get 74 people for the houses. He was in favour of the Government not to demolish houses. The Council had to demolish houses before against their wishes. He hoped they would not do that. He had always one thing in mind and that was to build houses for the workingman; that was his intention. He held that they should have 30 houses in Abbotside and 30 in Dungarvan. There was one thing more important than anything else and that was when these houses were built they would be able to build cheaper houses. Things would come down. The Government was going to be stern and compel people to bring prices down.

Mr. Veale said he did not think there was anything wrong about getting the views of the people. He would not agree to build only 20 houses. Twenty houses would be demolished and that would leave only 10 houses. The Abbotside scheme was very much advanced now and it took a long time. If the Gallows Hill scheme took that long there would be people waiting years for houses. He was very anxious to see both schemes go ahead, but one of the schemes was very advanced now and it should not be interfered with. He thought it would be wrong to interfere with it. He thought it just as well to build the number of houses for Abbotside. He was anxious to see the Gallows Hill scheme go ahead as soon as possible.

Senator Butler—You said 20 houses are to be demolished. I thought that 20 were to be reconditioned.

Mr. Veale—No, demolished. I am definite that 20 houses are to be demolished as they will be in the way of the new houses.

Senator Butler said he thought that the developing of the two sites (Gallows Hill and Abbotside) could go on in conjunction and let the houses be built in Dungarvan at the same time as the houses in Abbotside. He believed the houses would be wanted in Dungarvan and Abbotside too. As regards the suggestion that they should not go on with the building of 74 houses in Abbotside—there may be some reason in that. If they had 50 houses in Abbotside it might do. But they must have houses built in Dungarvan too. That was why they asked the Manager to go ahead with the Dungarvan scheme.

Mr. Kyne said he would like to enquire what Mrs. Deery had to say regarding the going ahead with the Abbotside scheme. If they did not go ahead with the full scheme they might have houses with rents of 4/- or 5/- more.

Senator Butler—If we do not get reasonable rents we will have to build them by direct labour.

Mr. Veale—My opinion is that you will have to advertise for the full scheme.

The Chairman said that there was no member of the Council but was in favour of getting houses built. If they built 40 or 50 in Abbotside with the intention of continuing the remainder later, it might do. He believed the price of materials would be much lower then and that would mean that the rents would be lower. He was looking at it from the economic point of view. He wanted to have the rents as low as possible. No member could tell what the rents would be.

Mr. Kyne—you can give the approximate rent.

Continuing, the Chairman said that there was another thing in connection with the Abbotside houses. It was said outside that some members of the Council did not want to give houses to Abbotside and were pitting one against the other. That was not true. He had as much respect for Abbotside as anyone and he thought Abbotside had as much respect for them. He thought these things should not be brought into discussions at all. He did not like this pitting one against the other at all.

Mr. Clancy said that some years ago when the housing scheme was spoken about some of the members
