To put it at a low average for a period of it at a low average for a period of varying seasons, the increase would be 2 to 3 tons per statute acre. It should never be forgotten, however, that failure to attend to proper spraying may, in a seriously bad season, lead to almost total destruction of the potato crop. Not alone is there an increased yield from well-spraying crops, but the resulting tubers are healthier and keep better owing to their being protected from the penetration of blight into the tubers themselves.

The spraying mixture commonly recommended is one consisting of 8 lbs. bluestone (copper sulphate) and 10 lbs, of washing soda of equal purity to 40 gallons of water. The use of finely ground bluestone facilities the dissolving of this constituent, which is best effected in a few gallons of hot water in the bottom of the barrel. The washing soda can be easily dissolved in a separate bar-
