I hope readers of this article in last week's issue noted my remarks regarding how unlucky "Stradbally's Choice" was in the race won by Moses Bolton Boy, as this game performer won on Saturday night at the nice price of 4 to 1 against and paid to follow. Another local owner Mr. M. Connors, Park, completed the double with "Cotton Prince," another 4 to 1 shot. An unlucky runner in this race was "Lawestown Lass" and I will not be surprised to see her returned a winner in the near future. One for your notebook is "Monday's Coup," an unlucky loser in her last outing, owing to interference she never got a chance and with better luck will win shortly. Miss Eily White's bitch, "Nomad King" posted her best for the opposition in her last outing and clocked the good time of 30.90. It was surprising to see her allowed to run at the very generous odds of 4 to 1. In fact, on her previous running, she should have been favourite. The 750 yards race on Saturday night was a top as none of the six competitors were stayers. The winner just struggled on gamely, the others tailed off with a couple not finishing. So I am afraid we are not breeding stayers at the moment. Mr. R. J. Moloney's (Dungarvan) "Hermitage Lady" very nearly upset another Westford good thing on Saturday night. The winner here, "Miss Harriet" was backed off the boards and only got up in the last stride to land the odds. Mr. Moloney's bitch looked like a winner but just failed at the line. This one is nicely bred, "Tanist-Castleton Darkie," and is sure to improve as the time was 29.10. Readers will be interested to hear that the winner of the Irish greyhound Derby to be run at Shelbourne Park on August 2nd will receive £1,000 and Cup. This is the biggest first prize ever offered in Ireland for a greyhound classic and the Shelbourne Park management deserves credit for their enterprise. It is to be hoped that prize-money for the breeders of the winners in future classics will be considered, as no doubt, it would help to promote the breeding of better greyhounds.

DUNGARVAN URBAN COUNCIL

Mr. T. McCarthy, chairman, presided at the meeting of the Dungarvan Urban Council on Friday. Also present—Messrs. L. A. Veale, Vice-Chairman; M. Clancy, Senator J. Butler and E. Deery, Town Clerk.

WAGES OF CASUAL WORKERS.

Arising from the Manager's orders relating to wages of casual employees of the Council and casual workers, the Chairman said that the casual workers only got the same as the constant employee. Long ago in Dungarvan the casual workers got more than the constant man. He held that the casual man, working for the Council should get more than the current rate. He thought that the Council should ask that they should get it. That was always the principle they adopted in Dungarvan.

Mr. Veale agreed and said that the casual man should get a higher rate. Chairman—remember a time when the casual rate was 12/6 a day and the constant rate was £2 15s. a week. I am subject to contradiction on that, but, as far as I remember, I think that was it. I am going back to 1920.

Mr. Veale—I think you are correct in that.

Chairman—I think you should agree with me that the casual man should be paid a higher rate.

The Clerk said that the difficulty about the men on relief schemes was that the total amount of the grant was expended.

Mr. Clancy—What is the arrangement now all over the town?

Chairman—I don't know.

Continuing, the Chairman said that during the week he was informed that certain things were happening regarding the employment of men on the Abbeyside scheme. If it was true what he heard, what he was going to ask was to have the Clerk write to the Secretary of the Union and ask if he (Secretary) was satisfied with the way the men were being employed on the scheme. He always understood that it was a Trade Union principle that it was unempowered men that should be employed. "I will not say any more," said the Chairman, "but I would ask the Clerk to write to the Secretary of the Union."

Senator Butler—I think it is he that should take the first step.

Chairman—The way I look at it—and I'm sure it is the way the men in charge are looking at it—is to have the best men. But if any man is able to do the job, let him do it.

Chairman—Do you think a man taken out of another job should get it?

Mr. Clancy—No, but if there is a good man that is idle he should be taken on.

Senator Butler—He was induced from this job by someone who was acting for the Council.

Chairman—Yes. The person who told me this did not tell me any lies. I did not go to investigate it because it was not any of my business. I don't think my way is the best way to do it the other way so. This man was taken from his own job. I don't know who he is; only all I know is the man who came to me and told me. The matter then dropped.

GALLOW'S HILL SCHEME.

Mr. Clancy said he understood more men had been taken on at the Abbeyside house. He was glad of that. He asked if any further sites had been acquired on the Gallow's Hill scheme.

Clerk—Mr. O'Meara's site has gone to the Department for sanction.

Replying to Mr. Veale, the Clerk said that the offer for Mrs. Kennedy's site was £240 and the original sum asked by her was £1,200. The Manager's order on the matter was that the Council's solicitor inform Mrs. Kennedy that the Council was prepared to pay £240, and that she was to pay the costs, etc.

Mr. Clancy said that he had two sites (Messrs. Dees' and O'Meara's) now here and they would hear from the Borough Surveyor later on if they could go ahead with developing the area.

Clerk—I understand it would be relatively cheaper to develop part of it than the whole of it.

Chairman—Flashes are needed in Dugarvan and we should start the houses in Shandon. I would be in favour of starting work in Dees' field and then we need not have to wait for 12 months.

Mr. Veale—This place is to be acquired by compulsion it will take a long time. I asked the Borough Surveyor about the developing and he said you could not develop unless you had the two fields.

Mr. Clancy—Is it intended to appoint an architect?

Clerk—Yes.

Mr. Clancy—I hold that we can develop portions of it and there will not be any extra cost. I am satisfied, however, to leave it in the hands of the Manager for the present. There may be something for the next meeting.

This was agreed to.

MARRIED PEOPLE IN LODGINGS.

The Clerk informed the meeting that 28 letters had been received—two from Abbeyside and 26 from the town—in reply to the advertisement asking married people in lodgings to send in their names.

Mr. Veale—A lot of people exist who had houses available we would get more than that.

Clerk—Some of the people seem

to think it was an application for the Abbeyside houses.

Mr. Clancy (to Chairman)—Did you get any more for your list?

Chairman—My number was a bit short.

The Clerk here read the names received.

A suggestion by the Chairman to leave an advertisement on the papers for another week, was agreed to.

SUNDAY EXCURSIONS.

In the course of a letter from C.I.E. in reply to the Council's resolution asking to run Sunday excursions during the summer from Fermoy and Waterford, it was stated that it would not be possible to run them either by rail or bus.

Senator Butler referred to the Clonmel-Yougal service, and asked if the Clonmel people had been consulted about that. He was of the opinion that the Clonmel people would prefer to come to Dungarvan.

Mr. Clancy—I don't know if we have sufficient attraction here for people from Fermoy, Clonmel or Yougal.

On the suggestion of Mr. Veale, it was agreed to ask C.I.E. to reconsider their decision.

PROPOSED BALL ALLEY.

A report from the Town-Planning Consultant regarding the proposed ball alley, considered this, the portion of the marsh on the Shandon road frontage would be suitable as well as for general recreational purposes.

Mr. Clancy thought it a bit far from the town.

Chairman—I think it would be an open site.

Mr. Clancy—The marsh was turned down by the Handball Committee.

Chairman—A short time before the marsh was turned down, I was in the place. Whoever got them to change I don't know.

Mr. Clancy—I don't agree with an alley so near the canal. That is my opinion.

The Clerk here read a letter from the committee, which stated that they were agreeable that the selection of the site be left to the Council's engineer.

Further consideration was deferred to the next meeting.

PROPOSED PUBLIC LAVATORY.

In a report from the Town-Planning Consultant, regarding sites for a proposed public lavatory, the following were suggested—1, Between the Courthouse and the Shambles; 2, between the Square and Fish Market; 3, Cul-de-sac at the northeast corner of the Square.

Senator Butler said that as no provision was made in the estimates for it, he did not see why it should be discussed.

The Clerk said there was only a token vote in the estimate for it.

Mr. Veale—I think it is disgraceful for a town like this not to have one.

Senator Butler—There are other amenities that are wanted as well as this and we are not going ahead with them.

Mr. Veale—it would be no harm to get information about the place near the Canal. If it is available, Senator Butler commented on the expense incurred by the Council for these reports.

Clerk—I think we should not ask for any more until we know what they are costing.

Clerk—You have already adopted the Town-Planning Act and all this more or less incidental to it.

Mr. Clancy referred to the report regarding the proposed ball alley and said that they might not agree with it, but they must pay for the reports. These reports were costing a lot of money.

Mr. Veale, referring to the proposed public lavatory site, said he would like to see the estimates for a site even if they did not put it up this year.

Mr. Clancy said he would oppose acquiring it. Anyway they were not going to do it this year.

Chairman—I would be in favour of making inquiries about it and other places the members have in mind.

This was agreed to.

BOHRENAIRA.

The Clerk told Senator Butler that a copy of the report on the Bohrenaire sites was sent to the Minister.

Mr. Veale—I would like to see Bohrenaire acquired, but the trouble now is we would have to buy it in open market.

Mr. Clancy said a terrible mistake had been made about this place in the beginning. He remembered suggesting building a better class house there but the members opposed him and said that a letting scheme should be there. He thought they must blame themselves to some extent about Bohrenaire.

Senator Butler said Bohrenaire had a lovely aspect. If they wanted a playground there was no other place to compare with it, if it was not wanted to build houses there. A ball alley could be built there too.

Mr. Clancy said he appreciated what Senator Butler said, but, at the same time, their residential quarters in town were very limited. He thought it was an ideal place for building a better class of house. He would dissent from acquiring it.

Chairman—We could acquire it, and then decide to have a recreational ground or to build on.

A resolution by Mr. Veale, seconded by the Chairman, that the Manager be asked to acquire Bohrenaire by agreement or otherwise for the purpose of a recreational ground or to build on as the Council may so consider, was passed.

OLD AGE PENSIONS.

A meeting of the Roushal No. 2 (Rural) Old Age Pensions Committee was held at Clashmore. Mr. B. J. Russell (chairman) presided and also present were—Messrs. W. Dower, M.C.; J. Mansfield, do.; T. Bagg, C. Curran and M. J. Power (Clerk). The minutes of the previous meeting were read and signed. Communications were read from the Department of Social Welfare in connection with claims that were before the previous meeting. Two claims were before the meeting. In connection with one of the claims, the Investigation Officer reported that as the applicant's gross annual income exceeded £39 5s., the claim was disallowed by the means test. It was decided to allow each of the claimants a weekly pension of 10/-. A pensioner in receipt of 6/- per week applied for an increase. It was decided to grant 10/- per week.
