### Vocational Education Committee.

At the monthly meeting of the above committee held at the Technical School, Dungarvan, on Monday last an An Fear Mor presided. Also present were Messrs. M. Clancy L. A. Veale, N. Kelly, D. Coghlan, M. F. Walsh, M. McGrath, M. Harty, Senator J. Butler, Mr. O'Keefe, Department Inspector, Mr. D. Cullinane, C.E.O., and Mr. R. Johnson, secretary, also present.

**Approvals**—Letters of approval were received from the Department in connection with the following:—For teachers summer courses, 1949; for the hire of a car for Domestic Economy Instructors; of honorarium to Seosamh O'Faithigh.

**Remuneration of Superintendents.**—A circular from the Minister of Education re the rates of remuneration to Superintendents stated that as it was extremely hard to secure Superintendents at the rate of 3/4 an hour, he approved of a rate increase up to 4/- according to qualifications, etc., of the Superintendent. This will remain until further notice.

**Discussion on Youth and the Trade.**—A circular from the Department on Instruction in Building in rural areas was read and was favoured by all. Speaking in support of such courses Mr. Clancy said that he would like to avail of the opportunity of paying tribute to the recent exhibition and to the recent course in ferriery. He stated that Mr. Colman, instructor, deserved their greatest praise and Mr. Kelly for the outstanding work they had accomplished for the school and for the students. If, he said, we had something like this for the building trade it would be excellent and would be a great help towards Ireland's housing drive.

The C.E.O. said that they would introduce the recommendations made in the Department's Rural Building Circular at the centre and judge by results.

At this stage Mr. Clancy asked if anything could be done to train young men for the plasterers trade and Mr. O'Keefe replied that at Dunmanway a rural building course was recently held and proved a great success. If they had enough students here they could have the same course, which would last about eight weeks. It would be open to apprentices of the trades working at the erection of houses and included all branches. Mr. Clancy also referred to the Woodwork Classes at the school, and stated that although the work done by the students was outstanding it was far from what they really wanted. This was because it was not done by young men anxious to get into the trade but by older men, who had no intention whatever of making their living by it.

Mr. Veale asked if it would be possible to make some allowance for the boy going to serve his time if that boy had already spent some years at the school.

Mr. O'Keefe replied that within the near future the trade unions will have to consider this matter and the Government will have to use some means of influence to get young men into the various trades.

### WATERFORD BOARD OF ASSISTANCE

The monthly meeting of the above was held at the Courthouse, Dungarvan, on Monday last. Mr. P. Caulfield, chairman, presided. Also present were Messrs. F. Roche, M. O'Ryan, W. Kennedy, P. Barron, P. Browne, T. A. Kyne, M. McGrath, and Senator J. Butler. Mr. M. O'Flinn, rumal, was also in attendance.

The following notice of motion by Senator J. Butler was passed:—That the August monthly meeting of the Board be held on the 22nd August, 1949.

A letter from the Department informed the Board that a grant would not be available for the proposed nurses' quarters at the County Hospital.

Commenting on this the Secretary said that as it was the Department who authorised the provision of accommodation for the nurses, then he thought they should make some grant available towards the cost.

It was finally decided that Messrs. Kyne and the engineer visit the offices on Monday next and report their views at the next meeting.

## Stradbally Neighbours At Law

### ASSAULT ALLEGED

(Before Mr. F. J. MacCabe, D.J.)

The above was held on Wednesday of this week. The principal case at hearing was one in which Mrs. Mary O'Reilly, of Stradbally, summoned a neighbour, Mrs. B. Finn and her son, James, for alleged assaults committed on the 8th and 9th July last.

In the case against the male defendant, complainant stated that defendant struck her with a hurley stick.

Dr. R. Counahan, State Solicitor, Waterford, was for Mrs. O'Reilly and Mr. T. C. Williams, Soir, Dungarvan, defence.

Outlining the case, Dr. Counahan stated that the case keeps a small pub in Stradbally which she has for many years. She also has a number of ducks and turkeys who may have given rise to the present charges. Near her house is a field belonging to people named Hannigan but let for a number of years to the defendants. They do not cultivate it but just keep it in pasture. Fowl belonging to his client go through the defendants' back grounds and she has a custom for a long number of years and in all that time there was never any trouble until the present.

Complainant, in evidence, stated that she lived with her husband, who is an invalid, and family, including her daughter, Ita. She keeps ducks and turkeys. On the 6th July last, the fowl were missing and as a result of something she had been told she went to Finn's land in search of the fowl where the female defendant's son prevented her from entering, with a shovel, which he held against her, and ordered her around to the front of the house. With that Mrs. Finn came on the scene and gave witness a slap into the face with her hand.

Mrs. O'Reilly had given neither party any provocation for the assault and she did not use any foul language on the occasion. She only went into the field in search of her fowl. The female defendant told witness after she had struck her that she had been waiting for a long time to get at her. On the 8th July last, witness had occasion to enter Hannigan's field where James Finn struck her with a hurley stick on the breast. He had often seen her crossing the same field before. On this occasion I had a sack and a knife in my possession as I was going to cut cabbage at the time. He also took the sack from me, after which I followed him and got the cabbage from him. Defendants warned to keep her fowl out and are constantly setting the hounds after my fowl. The field is rented to defendants for a good many years and we never had any trouble until the present six weeks ago. Two days after being assaulted by James Finn he told me that he would mob me if he caught me in the field again.

Cross-examined by Mr. Williams, complainant denied that she treated Hannigan's field as her property and she just let her fowl in there of their own free will. She never remembered getting a solicitor's letter warning her to keep her fowl out of the field. She had never before warned to keep her fowl out and had been doing it for the past 20 years, and there was never any objection. Witness had never been attacked previously whilst going for the fowl. Neither had she any words with Jas. Finn before and never rebuked him for setting the hounds after the fowl. She admitted having a bag and knife on the occasion of the second assault but was not aware that Finn had increased trouble with the water.

Witness also stated that the male defendant also knocked her on the ground and admitted that it might have only been a bit of a hurley stick.

### THE SCENES AT DUNGARVAN.

The recent disgraceful scenes in Dungarvan during the Old Parish Kilgobnet J.F. match have given rise to a flood of discussion and justified criticism throughout West Wick. We learn that a section of the spectators were chiefly responsible for the development of the regrettable incidents that occurred and their behaviour cannot be too strongly condemned. Some of the spectators attending matches at this centre have time and again acted in a most irresponsible and obstructive manner and the Board will now have to take definite action in the matter. Otherwise the general public will stay away from the ground. Fortunately most of our games in the division are free from such shocking conduct and the vast majority of Gaelic supporters are genuine sportsmen. A small minority have tarnished the good name of the association.

### WATERFORD SENIOR HURLERS.

Now that the Munster S.H. Championship has been decided it is the wish of many that the Waterford S.H. team "throw away" this year's title. Waterford were probably over-confident and insufficiently trained for the occasion. Limerick, on the other hand, were trained to the ounce. When things began to go badly for Waterford in the second half no switches or changes were made to remedy obvious faults on the side. Further, very lax refereeing helped in no small way in their downfall. We have certainly learned a very costly lesson for the future.

Tullyglass Idol will probably be the best fancied and with an inside draw should win. A good supporting programme with three heats of the consolation stake included will give the runners plenty of scope for betting.

CO. WATERFORD COMMITTEE OF AGRICULTURE.

Sheep Breeding Scheme 1949.

FOR the purpose of improving the breeds of mountain sheep in Co. Waterford, the Waterford Committee of Agriculture are prepared, subject to the approval of the Department of Agriculture, to locate a limited number of high-grade black-face rams on the commonage areas of the Comeragh and Knockmealdon Mountains on the following conditions:—(1) The Committee shall grant to each selected applicant a premium of from £5 to £8 on the basis that the value of the premium shall be less by £2 than the cost price of the ram, subject to a maximum premium of £8. (2) In the allocation of rams, preference will be given to applicants who apply on behalf of sheep owners who are prepared to mate the rams to selected ewes. (3) The Committee will understand that only rams of a high standard of quality will be selected, but they cannot undertake responsibility in case any animal should prove unfruitful or unsatisfactory for breeding purposes. (4) Each applicant shall be required to lodge with his application a deposit of £2. Of the amount so lodged, one half may be retained by the Committee where a sufficient supply of rams being available, a selected applicant fails to procure a ram. (5) In all cases of dispute in matters connected with this Scheme the decision of the Minister for Agriculture shall be final.
