## WATERFORD REPEAT 1938 PERFORMANCE

### Munster Champions Qualify For All-Ireland Final

#### Minor Hurlers' Classic Display.

Attendance 31,843; Gate Receipts, £2,783 10s. 3d.

S.H.—Waterford, 3-7; Galway 1-6.  
M.H.—Waterford, 8-12; Galway, 3-2.

At Croke Park on Sunday the Waterford senior hurlers took Galway in their stride, and had it not been for the marvellous display of their goalkeeper Duggan, the men from the West would have taken the greatest trouncing in the history of the Association. The game was as good as could be expected with Galway engaged and was a big improvement on last year's semi-final, played at Birr when several Kilkenny players were injured.

The Westerners turned up in traditional style and from the very start went all out to play the man and with the referee overlooking some infringements of the rules, the game was of the rough type. There was no doubt about the superiority of the Munster champions and from the very early stages they had complete control of the game, but the seven-point margin rather flatters Galway (as was also the case in the match with Cork).

The pitch was admirably laid out though the sod was heavy and the grass too high for classed ground hurling. Waterford were on top in all departments. Jim Ware had a rather easy day in goal, the only ball which passed him was scooped in from a goal-line scrumming. Full-back J. Cusack dealt promptly with changing forwards. Only twice did the full-back get into the line during the game, on both occasions he was dispossessed. Behind this devastating defender J. Ware operated untroubled.

In the corner Andy Fleming was equally severe and lashed out anything that came his way. On the left Jackie Goode, although on sick leave for the past few weeks played the best game of his life. His long clearance will long be remembered in Galway.

Capt. V. Baston proved he is almost unbeatible and was out on his own. He sent a seventy to the net in the first few minutes. On his left Mick Hayes gave the Galway winger no chance. His long clearances and accurate striking were features of the game. He put in a terrific second half.

The new-comer, J. Galvin justified his selection. A sound defender, playing man and ball he acquitted himself with credit. In the Waterford centre-forward pair again had the better of the exchanges. E. Carey who had Waterford's first score, scored a goal in a vast amount of work. Johnny O'Connor as usual completely outclassed his opponent. K. O'Connor having a nasty knock on the head in the second quarter played another smashing game.

John Keane at centre-forward beat everybody. He was the best forward on the field, he scored two goals. On his right W. Galvin met several opponents during the game, he was being continually reuffled. He did well against all comers and sent ball after ball into the fulling.

If you have a just grievance on any track demand an inquiry and don't get satisfied until you are paying the piper and have a right to sometimes call the tune.

## ABBEYSIDE HOUSING SCHEME

URBAN COUNCIL CONSIDER TENDER TOO HIGH.

WORK TO BE DONE BY DIRECT LABOUR.

The Abbeyside Housing Scheme is to be completed by direct labour. This decision was made by the Urban Council at the adjourned meeting on Monday night after considering the Acting Borough Surveyor's report on the tender (only one was received) for the building of the houses.

The tender was received from J. McGrath and Son, Dungarvan, and was as follows—Cost per house of best possible construction, £1,488 18s. 6d.; cost per house of cheapest possible construction, £1,888 10s.

The Acting Borough Surveyor's observations on the tender were: "As this shows no reduction from the amount submitted in the original tenders I cannot recommend its acceptance. In view of this I see no alternative but to have the scheme completed by direct labour." As regards the receiving of the tender by him for a report thereon the Acting Borough Surveyor said: "I might add that the tender was received by me at 6.30 p.m. on Friday evening, 19th August, so that it would be impossible for me to have had it examined and reported on for the meeting at 8.15 p.m."

In a discussion on the Acting Borough Surveyor's report, Mr. Kyne said he favoured the scheme being done by direct labour as it would give them an opportunity of building houses which would be models for the country. He felt sure that they could rely on the co-operation of all Deputies in the county as this matter was far beyond politics. They would get the help of the trades unions, and he asked that representatives of the unions be invited to a special meeting to make all necessary arrangements.

### No Report on Abbeyside Housing Tender.

URBAN COUNCIL ADJOURNS AS PROTEST.

"JOKE GOING ON TOO LONG"—MR. KYNE.

The Urban Council meeting on last Friday was adjourned as a protest because a report on the Abbeyside Housing Scheme was not before the meeting.

The meeting was adjourned on the motion of Mr. T. A. Kyne, T.D. who said they should adjourn as a protest and show their dissatisfaction.

The other members present were—Messrs. T. McCarthy (chairman) and L. A. Veale (vice-chairman).

Before the motion for adjourning was passed, some items on the agenda had been dealt with.

LAOCH OF SANITARY ARRANGEMENTS COMPLAINT.

Mr. M. Fitzgerald, Strand Street came before the meeting regarding the lack of sanitary arrangements in the house he occupies. He asked the Council if they could do anything about it.

The Chairman said that Mr. Fitzgerald was hard hit as he had two families and there was no lavatory in his house. Some time ago he (Mr. Fitzgerald) came before the meeting and made a similar complaint and the Council made an order that Mr. Walsh, S.S.O. have a look at it. And as far as he (Chairman) knew from that day to this they got no report about it.

Mr. Kyne said he thought that at that meeting there was something about distance from the sewer and whose responsibility it would be. Recommendations were being made and the Council never heard any more about them.

## ARCHITECTS APPOINTED.

Mr. Kyne thought that the employment should be given to people in the county. He understood that Mr. M. Connel, Waterford, was one of the applicants. He (Mr. Kyne) did not know what the Borough Surveyor based his facts on. It was up to them to express their opinion on this and he believed that in County Waterford there were architects capable and fit to fill this position. He protested against it.

Replying to Mr. Veale the Clerk stated that the same firm were the Town Hall architects.

For the Abbeyside scheme the Clerk informed the meeting that only one tender had been received and had been referred to the Acting Borough Surveyor for a report, but he (the Clerk) had not got it yet.

Mr. Kyne—I was anxious that we would have it to-night.

Chairman—The town is looking forward to it to-night.

Clerk—The Borough Surveyor only get it to-day.

Mr. Kyne—I want to express my dissatisfaction at the system. The tender is in now four days—since last Tuesday—and it wouldn't take four hours to deal with. I think this joke is going on too long, and I propose we adjourn to show our dissatisfaction and draw attention to it, and we will get co-operation in the future.

The Chairman agreed that the report should be before the Council that night and the Council agreed to adjourn as a protest.

TEAMS CONGRATULATED.

Before the meeting adjourned the Chairman said he would like to express their congratulations to the Senior and Junior hurling teams that played at Thurles on the 19th. The Senior match was one of the finest he saw for a long time and there was not one dirty incident in it. They certainly got thrills and excitement in the last few minutes. He also like to congratulate the losers for the many way they took their defeat. He had great pleasure in proposing that they send a letter of congratulation to the Secretary of the County Board, the selectors and the trainers. It should be mentioned that they had three men from Dungarvan and one from Abbeyside on the team and each one of them excelled themselves and played a magnificent game. On the minor team they had five boys and they also excelled themselves. He would also like to congratulate the junior football team that beat Limerick, so that they now had three teams—senior, junior hurling and junior football—that have won three Munster Championships this year. He directed that the Clerk write letters of congratulation to those he had already mentioned and to Messrs. T. Curran, C. Moylan, J. Goode and J. O'Connor (Abbeyside), the local members of the senior hurling team.

Mr. Kyne, seconding, said he would like to include Rev. Bro. Murray and Mr. M. Foley, N.T. who did a big part in the training of the teams. He would like to wish them God-speed in the semi-final and he expressed the hope that they would bring the laurels to the county.

Mr. Veale, associating himself with the resolution said he never saw so much excitement in Dungarvan as when the teams came back. He hoped that the team would bring the All-Ireland Cups to the county. It was a good clean game and he expressed the hope that other teams would take a pattern from it.

The Chairman also paid tribute to the two trainers—M. Foley, Dungarvan, and J. Ware in the East. The meeting then adjourned until Monday night.

Obsequies of Very Rev. J. Gleeson, P.P., Aglish.

A remarkable tribute of respect and esteem was paid by both clergy of the diocese and his parishioners to Very Rev. John Gleeson P.P., Aglish and Bellinacree, at his obsequies at Aglish Parish Church on last Saturday.

Virtually every family in the two combined parishes, as well as families from neighbouring parishes were represented in the overflowing congregation at the Office and High Mass, while the members of the Chapter and clergy attended in large numbers.

WEST DIVISION G.A.A. NOTES

By "AN RUNAIDHE"

CROKE PARK.

The double came off on Sunday as expected and all Waterford rejoice. Now we look forward to a great day on September 5th. The Minors can be described as a superb team, although a couple of players were very definitely out of form on Sunday but then it may have been that that peculiar Croke Park atmosphere got a hold of them. However we can expect them to be all right for the final against Kilkenny. Kilkenny will be a harder team to beat than any Waterford have met so far, but I know that our boys will bring home All-Ireland honours on September 5th.

The senior game left a lot open to criticism. Perhaps readers will think that as the team won things should be left alone and hope for the best on the next occasion. I do believe in that view. Let us see if anything was wrong on Sunday.

The game opened with Waterford having the advantage of a very strong wind. Galway had two points in the first two minutes, and then Waterford took command of the game, the ball very rarely crossing the half-way line for the remainder of the first half. Carew had a point in the third minute and Boston a goal in the fifth minute. No further score came until the 15th minute when Moylan had a point, the first score by a forward in the 15th minute, despite the fact that the play was in the Waterford half for 15 minutes. Something was wrong. As a matter of fact a number of things were wrong. The two corners were repeatedly got the ball past the backs, to leave it roll over the line. The half-forwards should have gone for points. It is a sad reflection on our forward play to think that after 20 minutes, with full control of the game, the forwards showed only 1 goal and 3 points; up for Waterford, and of that score only 1 point had been scored by a forward. Galway had scored 3 points and Waterford led by only 3 goals and a bare ten minutes of the wind advantage remaining. I must take it that it was the selectors who were to the rescue by switching W. Galvin and K. O'Connor, if the switch was the reason for the success of the forwards in the second half, then we should be as good as winners. Keane (two goals), Moylan, Curran and Galvin (a point each) scored before half-time when the score was 3-6 to 3 points in our favour.

I, for one, did not feel happy at half-time. Twelve points of lead did not seem enough, and the likelihood of adding anything to the score seemed very remote. The game seemed to be as only one point, was scored in the second half. Another thing which had to be taken into consideration at half-time was the fact that in the matches against Cork and Clare our boys fell away at the three-quarter stage, and now faced with practically a 3-6 lead, the chances of our backs having a better chance of success than ever. They did last out, however; but here another factor enters into the game—the Galway forwards were bad. Time and again the half-forwards had scores for the taking, but either missed the ball or possessed themselves. But still the backs did very well and Ware had only a few shots to deal with in the hour.

To sum up I think that both sets of forwards were poor, but whereas the Galway men were bad 2 was a case of wrong tactics by Waterford. I feel that we can face the final with great confidence. We must consider that in Thurles, Waterford played hurling with a hurling team and beat them, but last Sunday's game was not with a hurling team; team and nobody expected that it would be. Dublin are a hurling team and Waterford can beat them. After all it happened to be a Cork-Dublin final. Cork would be firm favourites, so I feel to see why Waterford cannot win.

JUNIOR FOOTBALL SEMI-FINAL.

Off again on Sunday—this time to Waterford to see the junior football teams play Dublin in the All-Ireland Semi-final. Again I feel confident of success. Waterford are the better team, despite Dublin's big win over Wexford in the Leinster Final as a guide. Dublin scored six goals which speaks very badly of the Wexford defence, but it was only the brilliancy of the Dublin goalkeeper that kept Wexford from winning, so that both sets of backs must have been poor.

WESTERN CHAMPIONSHIPS.

We cannot lose sight of our own local games. At Cappoquin on Sunday, the home side met St. David's in a second round hurling tie. Cappoquin will field a few of the Inter-County Minor team and expect to win, but this is a year of surprises. The game starts at 2 p.m. to enable anyone wishing to see the Tallon and Tourin replay at Lismore, which is timed for 4.30. This game should be an improvement on the drawn match at Tourin, showing a very definite lack of training on the last day and consequently the stoppages for players wounded destroyed it. As I expect there to be much better on Sunday I am confident of their success. But it will be a good game and the margin of victory small.

Portlaw Dispensary Plans Approved.

MINISTER ASKS TO POSTPONE HOSPITALISATION SCHEME.

Councillor P. Caulfield, chairman, presided at the monthly meeting of the Waterford Board of Assistance at Dungarvan on Monday. Also present—Councillors P. O'Connor, "Fad" Brown, Messrs T. Duggan, R. Barrow, M. O'Ryan, M. McGrath, F. Roche, Mrs. P. A. Croke, Acting Secretary; Mr. G. J. Dowling, Deputy Manager, and Mr. M. Phelan Superintending Medical Assistance Officer.

PORTLAW DISPENSARY.

Mr. M. Hassett, reporting on the proposed dispensary at Portlaw, said that as directed he had prepared the plan (which he submitted to the Board) and interviewed Dr. Prendergast, H.M.S.O. (Mr. Hassett) what were the essentials and other additions required if the cost was not to be excessive. He (Dr. Prendergast) gave the Board a list of what he wanted to explain what it was proposed to have on the ground floor, namely, dispensing room, consulting room, waiting room and store. The cost would be £650. He thought they would have a good dispensary for the amount. If the Board wanted to take in the top floor the total cost would be about £800. Mr. Roche said that it was a new building with accommodation it would cost £2,000.

Replying to the Chairman, Mr. Roche said he would be quite satisfied with it. It would mean that the dispensary at Portlaw would be a dispensary as this would do for the next 50 years. Alleged attempted Suicide Charge—A charge of attempted suicide against Wm. Barry, 34 Loughmore, was adjourned generally. Drunk—The following were fined for drunkenness—Jas. Butler, Spring (5/-), John Wright, Tourin (10/-), P. O'Brien, Shandon (10/-), J. Havens, 60, Loughmore (10/-). Sgt. Liddane and Garda Glinn and McGowan were complainants. Application to Bind to Peace—Ed. Daly, 10, Cathal Brugha Place, summoned Mrs. Mary Nagle, Cathal Brugha Place, for abusive language and applied to have her bound to the peace. Mr. A. R. Farrell for complainant and Mr. L. F. Labagan for defendant. Complainant gave evidence that the defendant came to his house on June 12 and abused him and his wife and also used bad language. Mrs. Daly, complainant's wife, gave corroborative evidence. Mrs. Mary Nagle, defendant, denied going into complainant's house and abusing her. Witness said she was bound to the peace 3 1/2 years ago. Justice—Are you quite sure that it was 3 1/2 years ago you were bound to the peace? Witness—I am quite sure it was not. My recollection is that it was within the last 12 months. It is told you on this occasion to stand up and speak. I am going to give you the same advice now. The Justice made an order binding the defendant to the peace to be of good behaviour for 12 months if he had any previous convictions. He allowed £10 costs, with a month to pay. CHILDREN'S COURT. Three school-children from the town aged 10, 13 and 14 were before the Children's Court on charges of larceny. One of the children was charged with stealing a harley (valued at 4/-) and a football (valued at £2). The mother of the boy accused a receipt for the buying of the harley and also £2 for the cost of the football. The Justice waived the boy and applied the F.O.A. In the case of the other boys they were charged with the larceny of a fountain pen and a wallet (valued 17/6). Supt. O'Mahony, who presides, said that between July 3 and 4, these two boys went into Messrs. Haddell's shop through a skylight and stole the pen and wallet. This was not so much as a (Supt.) thought that he would have to ask to take into consideration other things.
