Fertiliser Credits (Wheat) Scheme.

Notice to Holders of Fertiliser Credit Dockets issued in respect of the 1944 Wheat Crop.

THE Minister for Agriculture who are in possession of fertiliser credit dockets issued for the 1944 crop that arrangements have now been made to issue credit vouchers in exchange for these dockets. Dungarvan Handball Club. FIRST ANNUAL MEETING.

Present—Mr. P. J. O'Gorman, T.D., chairman, presiding; Mrs. S. Hurley, Messrs. L. Daly, E. P. Lynch, V.C., and Sean P. Daly, B.E. and M. D. Broderick. Mr. A. Powell, B.L., Manager, was also present.

In reply to a member, the Clerk stated that the Department had not yet sanctioned the Talow Street housing sites.

The Clerk was instructed to again write to the L.G.D.

Mr. Lynch—Any reply to the council's request for a harbour grant.

Town Clerk—No, but I did write to each of the T.D.s and am awaiting a reply.

Chairman—As far as any request I got I contacted the Department immediately.

It was decided to await a reply from the T.D.s.

A resolution from the Association of Municipal Authorities re better grants for housing was unanimously adopted on a proposition by Mr. Daly, B.E., seconded by Mr. Lynch.

Mr. Broderick—Houses are essential and if we had more houses we would have less T.B. hospitals.

With regard to rents on vacant property, the Manager said that all owners of vacant property must pay rates and the Manager may subsequently make a refund.

Mr. Lynch—With regard to small shops on the strand which may be idle for the whole winter season, I know they get as much out of them in three months as winter in other shops in town would get in twelve months.

Chairman—With regard to the Youghal Bridge, there was an unanimous resolution passed at the last Bridge Committee meeting and this resolution was sent to the Minister. It was similar to the first resolution, which was sent to the Minister, which stated that the bridge should not be erected above the site of the existing bridge. I discussed the matter with the Minister, who wanted a resolution without qualification, but as the majority was in favour of the resolution qualifying where the new bridge was to be erected I fell in with the majority. The County Council will have their meeting on the 9th proximo and will approve of the resolution as passed by the Bridge Committee. I can tell you that the Minister is most anxious to have a new bridge put up.

Mrs. Hurley—How many years are they going on with it?

Chairman—Nine years.

Mr. Lynch—I am the other representative of the U.D.C. on the Bridge Committee, and I agreed with the majority of the committee. I do not see why any full powers should be given to any Minister. You all know the position as far as the Youghal Bridge is concerned, and without a doubt the Minister must be said and led by the engineers. I say it is the people of Cork and Waterford who should have had say and not the Minister or his engineers.

Mr. Broderick—It is an extraordinary thing if the role of the people is to be stifled by the engineers.

Chairman—I have a feeling that

the present Minister is desirous of meeting the wishes of the people of Youghal who are vitally interested. The Minister is fully alive to the seriousness of the matter and has said so.

Mr. Daly, B.E.—I understood that the reason for the hold up was that the County Council were not applying for a Bridge Order. Was it stated that the application should be unqualified? You cannot blame the people for being resentful.

Mrs. Hurley—Something should be done immediately. Ask the Minister to come to Youghal and see bridge. I would suggest you blow up the bridge yourselves.

Finally, the Town Clerk was instructed to again get in touch with the Department and request that the matter be expedited.

With regard to the I.T.B.'s proposals for Youghal, Mr. Daly proposed and Mr. Broderick seconded that the Town Clerk find out what is the position in so far as the railway shed site is concerned.

Manager—I met Mr. O'Brien in 1942 and at that time his intention was to move Clonacloy.

Mr. Lynch—It is a lively looking site now.

Mr. Broderick—The Irish Tourist Board has been one huge mistake from beginning to end.

Mrs. Hurley—Why not take the place over ourselves?

The discussion ended.

A resolution from the U.D.C.'s of Monahan, Clonacloy, Carrickmacross and Carrigrohane asked that the Government make available for urban roads grants similar to those which have been made available for County Councils in respect of county roads was unanimously adopted on a proposition by Mr. Broderick, seconded by Mr. L. Daly.

Resolutions of sympathy were passed to the families and relatives of the late Mr. John Buttiner on a proposition by Mr. Daly, B.E., seconded by Mr. Lynch, V.C., and of the late Mrs. E. Cooper on a proposition by Mr. Broderick, seconded by the Chairman and Mr. L. Daly.

Mr. Lynch—I saw on the public Press where Robert Nunn, a local young man, saved the life of a young fellow named Keogh from Sandfield Terrace. I think he deserves the congratulations of the Urban District Council, and I also think that the matter should be referred to the Carnegie Hero Fund Trust.

Mr. Lynch—There is no doubt about it, it just shows what the fishermen of Youghal have done in life-saving. I think the matter should be brought before the proper authorities. I am aware that young Nunn lost a suit of clothes as he dived in fully clothed.

Chairman—Young Nunn performed a plucky deed.

Mrs. Hurley—I wish to be associated with what has been said in regard to young Nunn. Other men went out to rescue fellow-men in distress, too, said Mrs. Hurley. I refer to the Barry Bros. and a young Bransfield who, in the teeth of a gale, went to the rescue of three Cork boys whose boat had capsized, and I think their case too should be referred to the proper quarter. With regard to this particular case, a gross inaccuracy was printed in a local paper about these men or rather persons closely associated with them. In this paper the persons referred to were called imposters; they were the son of the Barry Brothers and father of young Bransfield, whom I invited into my hotel, and who did not drink with my guests. They were given some refreshments to take home; they were decent respectable fishermen who were being called imposters.

Mr. Lynch, V.C.—I think persons who send such news should first make sure of their facts and not call decent men imposters; they are not imposters and I think it should go forward from this Council that the paper referred to should be requested to express regret. Mr. Broderick seconded.

Sympathy was extended to Mr. William Quirke on the death of his sister, on the proposition of Mr. Lynch seconded by Mrs. Hurley.
