St. Augustine's Feast Honoured

CEREMONIES AT AUGUSTINIAN CHURCH.
The feast of St. Augustine, Patron Saint of the Augustinian Order, was observed with the usual fitting and appropriate ceremony at St. Augustine's Church, Dungarvan, on last Sunday. There was Solemn High Mass at 5.30 p.m. and after the Gospel a panegyric on the Saint was delivered by Rev. Dr. Ahern, master of ceremonies, Rev. Fr. Dunne, O.S.A. presiding.
Very Rev. T. Canon O'Brien, P.P., V.F. presided at the feast. The celebrant was Very Rev. P. D. Cummins, O.S.A., Prior; deacon, Rev. Fr. P. A. Crowe, O.S.A.; sub-deacon, Rev. Fr. Ferrando O.S.A. master of ceremonies, Rev. Fr. Dunne, O.S.A.

THE SERMON.
Taking as his text for his sermon: "This is the victory which overcometh the world our faith" (1 John, 5: 4). Rev. Dr. Ahern said: "We are assembled here to-day to recall the memory of St. Augustine and to pay to him one of God's greatest saints, the tribute of our veneration. The Augustinian Order rightly claims him as their great Patron, but he does not belong to that Order in any exclusive sense; the Order itself will deliver the first of its annual addresses to the non-Catholic alike must admit that St. Augustine is a figure of international stature and of universal appeal.

"Think for a moment of the man who was called to him. Political thinkers of all shades of belief and unbelief have sought guidance and inspiration in the writings of Augustine. The theologians of the Catholic Church by every age have regarded the writings of Augustine as a storehouse from which to draw definition and explanation of the Catholic Faith; the prince of Catholic theologians, the Dominican, St. Thomas Aquinas, has quoted from Augustine on almost every page of his many works. Sinners in every age have looked on Augustine as the wonderful example of Divine Grace triumphant; and they have sought and found in his victory over sin and temptation the strength to win victories of their own in that same struggle. Heretics of every shade who have wandered from the Faith, have looked for proof and justification of their errors in the writings of Augustine; strange irony that men should seek from him defence of error, from him who for forty years with tongue and pen, waged ceaseless war on error, from him who defended the Faith so valiantly that he has been called 'the hammer of heretics,' the greatest Doctor of the Church.

"Yes! Augustine of Hippo is an international figure; he belongs to no sect outside the Catholic Church, and to no group or body within it; he belongs to the Catholic Church itself and to alone; he belongs to the members of that Church by a right of faith. He is an ageless figure; he belongs to an ageless faith. Bishop of a small city on the coast of North Africa in the fourth and fifth centuries, he was to enter this church at this moment he would belong here, for he would ascend that altar to offer the sacrifice which the celebrant is now about to offer, the same sacrifice which he offered on his own altar in Hippo 1,500 years ago; he would ascend this pulpit to preach the same doctrines which are preached here week by week; the same doctrines which he preached so often from his own pulpit in Hippo. A span of 1,500 years would be bridged, and bridged securely, by a bond of faith, the Catholic Divine faith unchanged and unchangeable.
