Hospital Patients' "Hunger Strike" Protest

"Food Not Up To Standard" STATEMENT AT BOARD OF ASSISTANCE MEETING.

That male tuberculosis patients in the County Hospital, Waterford, had gone on "hunger strike" recently as a protest against the food given to them, was stated by Mr. T. Kyne in a report on an inspection of the hospital made on July 20, read at the Board of Assistance meeting at Dungarvan on last Monday.

The report stated that the male T.B. ward in the hospital had some two weeks earlier had become necessary for them to refuse dinner as a protest against the food given to them. Since the protest the food was satisfactory. The Sister stated that the protest was made stated. The reason that the food was not up to standard at the time was, she stated, that eggs were not available. One of the patients informed me that his brother, Robert Mason, left the hospital as a result of being blamed by the doctor for causing the protest.

The report continued: "It was because I had heard outside that a hunger strike had taken place that I visited the hospital."

The report added that in reply to his (Mr. Kyne's) questions patients in all wards said that the food was satisfactory in quantity and in the manner in which it was prepared, with the exception of the T.B. ward. Mr. Kyne also stated that he received every facility from the Sister in charge during the visit.

Following the reading of the report by Mr. M. O'Flynn, Secretary, Mr. Kyne said that the statements were made in the presence of the Sister in charge. He was informed of these events and he went to call on Councillor O'Connor to go with him to contact him and then went up on my own," said Mr. Kyne, "and the facts are as I have put down, badly in my report."

The Secretary said that the Matron had been asked for a report on the matter and had made one. The Secretary then proceeded to read the complaint made by Mr. Kyne, that in the last week of June, the steam boiler was being prepared for annual inspection; the steam supplied was practically cut off, so that the food was practically cut off and the food was cooked under difficult conditions, as other apparatus for cooking was altogether inadequate. "The potatoes (continued the report) were not good at the end of the season, and the turnips were uneatable. (Some short while previous to that our ordinary turnip supplier informed us that the turnips as they were not fit for human use). Cabbage, too, was in short supply. For a few weeks at that time we were unable to get the usual supply of eggs."

Dr. Shipsey stated he did not blame the patient, Robert Mason, but simply pointed out to him that if he had any complaints about the food, he should have reported to him. They had not done so. Dr. Shipsey visited the kitchen the day after the protest, and he found a perfectly good dinner prepared."

Following the reading of the report, Mr. Kyne said there was no point in stating that Dr. Shipsey found a good dinner being prepared. "The fact (Mr. Kyne) would suggest that it was padding of the worst kind to suggest that he said it was bad. The excuse about the boiler was not given to him, or was he told about the potatoes or turnips or cabbage? He was told that eggs were scarce. "That the patients were living on tea and bread and butter."

Councillor O'Connor said it was quite clear that something was wrong listening to that report. "I thought this was a very serious thing to occur in a hospital. The world has not seen anything like that happening in a private hospital. He thought the case should be taken when tenders were issued that the different people who tenders should be able to supply the food. There was no contract at all.

Mr. Kyne said that the explanation in the matron's report was weak. He did not touch on the things mentioned in the report, as he did not know about them except the eggs. Now it stated that potatoes were bad at that time but the potatoes were all right for him or anyone else to eat. Surely they could be some alternative. Really they were living on tea and bread and butter and a bit of meat or maybe they were not allowed to have meat. He agreed with Councillor O'Connor that it would not happen in a private hospital.

Councillor O'Connor—I think it is reasonable that it should not occur in the future.

Mr. O'Ryan said that potatoes were bad at that time of the year.

Councillor O'Connor—I believe that the best available potatoes and food should be available for people in hospital, especially T.B. patients.

Mr. O'Ryan—I was in hospital in Dungarvan recently and I was treated very well there. I say there are lots of people and it is hard to please them.

Councillor O'Connor—I am concerned with the matron's report and things seem to be wrong in that hospital.

Chairman (to Mr. Kyne)—When you visited the hospital did you speak to the matron?

Mr. Kyne—No; the Sister in charge was the only person available, and she said nothing about potatoes to me.

Chairman—That is the strange thing about it. Now we hear that potatoes were scarce and that the boiler was out of order.

Mr. O'Ryan—Was the boiler wrong?

Councillor O'Connor—She says it was and surely she is not telling lies. The Secretary pointed out the insurance people inspected the boiler and that would interfere with the cooking arrangements that day. They generally give notice of it.

Councillor O'Connor—Alternative arrangements could be made.

Mr. O'Ryan—The statement that there was no suggestion by him that the food was bad. Certain other things had been mentioned which he did not know such as the scarcity of potatoes and turnips and cabbage. Things were bad if the matron's reports were correct and which he assured it was.

Councillor O'Connor said that these patients had the moral courage to make a protest. It was very difficult for a patient to admit anything because "he is going to be made feel it."

Mr. O'Ryan—I say that we should ask Dr. Shipsey for a report on the matter.

Councillor O'Connor—I propose we should ask the Deputy Matron and that we strongly protest against the conditions in the hospital at the time previous to the report being made and the strength of the matron's report something was definitely wrong that should not be.

Mr. Kyne said that he thought that Dr. Shipsey should be asked how a "good dinner" could be prepared, seeing that the potatoes were bad, and that turnips and cabbage were scarce and that there were no eggs. That was the way he (Mr. Kyne) read the matron's report.

Councillor O'Connor said that the way he read it too, that a few days after he (Dr. Shipsey) saw the dinner being prepared.

Mr. O'Ryan said that if that were true it would be a very interesting case. Mr. Kyne said for a report on the matter.

Councillor O'Connor—I am sure that this would not be carried out in any private hospital.

Mr. Kyne—I did not visit the hospital until after the strike; it was in fact of three weeks after I was informed of it, and I thought it my duty to go there.

Ald. Kennedy said he went on a few years and I never found anything wrong there.

Chairman—Anyway, T.B. patients should not get a bad dinner.

At this stage Mr. O'Ryan made a remark about publicity, inadvisable in the press, and Councillor O'Connor said that some people seemed to be afraid of publicity.

Mr. O'Ryan—Except when it comes in the proper way.

Councillor O'Connor—Did not this come in the proper way?

Mr. O'Ryan—It should come from the doctor.

Mr. Kyne—It is a freely admitted fact that some people seemed to be afraid of publicity.

Chairman—It should be made public and I have had many letters and addresses if they are wanted.

Chairman—I think we should ask Dr. Shipsey for a report.

Senator Butler—There is no reflection on Dr. Shipsey at all. Mr. Kyne—it is not intended that way.

Senator Butler—Surely he does not go to the kitchen every time he goes to the hospital.

Mr. Kyne—He couldn't do it.

Senator Butler—Yes, he has a considerable amount of work to do. Following further discussion, Councillor O'Connor did not move his motion, and it was agreed to ask Dr. Shipsey for a report for the next meeting.

AN EXILE'S CONGRATULATIONS

We have just received the following letter from Mr. Dennis O'Connor, Seattle, Washington, dated 7/9/48:

Editor, "Dungarvan Observer."

Dear Sir—Now and then I see a copy of the "Dungarvan Observer," so I'm well acquainted with the doings of the boys from the County Waterford on the hurling fields these many years. However, as an erstwhile North of Ireland man, and as a follower of Gaelic pastimes for well-nigh sixty years, I pen these lines to congratulate through you, the young men from Co. Waterford for their great success on Sunday last at Croke Park, Dublin, in winning the All-Ireland honours at long last. It was, I am sure, a popular victory of some and abroad.

However, Mr. Editor, I would like to know what wrong with County Waterford football. The victory on Sunday last put me in a reminiscent mood. For example, my mind went back a day in May in the year 1909—Dublin versus Kerry, in an All-Ireland football final at Thurles. There were three strapping young Waterford footballers on the Dublin representation on that occasion, and if my memory serves me rightly at this time, their names were Walsh, Hilliard and Tom Healy, the latter probably the youngest player on the field. In retrospect I can still see his long black hair everywhere, his high and fearless holding, and his long powerful drives, which were a treat. They were indeed grand footballers, a credit to their county as well as to the county they represent. Reproduce their kind to-day and All-Ireland football honours are within the reach of that grand old county, washed by Atlantic seas.

Anyway, good luck to the hurling boys from the County Waterford—may they reign.

I paid a visit to Athy this week to see the very successful stud dog, Bella's Prince. I must say he is a grand looker and I have seldom seen a dog in better condition. He is surely a credit to his owner, Mr. Noonan. I saw this dog running on the track in 1943 and although about four years at stud he is as full of life as a sapling. This fellow is beautifully bred by Castlewood Lad out of Bella's Witch and at the moment is rated the best sire of winners in the country and all famous winners, including the famous Harvest King, Lady Maud and Sheeran, winner of the Scottish Puppy Derby. The others are too numerous to mention here, but he is getting them good at both games. Several of his puppies are trial stage winners including Principality, winner of the North Kilkenny Cup. A study of his pedigree is interesting particularly his dam line which goes back to the famous brood bitch, Burieta and her sire, Castlewood Lad, a double cross of Mutton Culet, and Milkham Tom through Castlewood Lad and Bella's Brother and all crown in all Meadow Fescue (sire of Castlewood Lad) was out of the great bitch, Karagan, who was by Beaded Dick out of One Drop. So this is surely a well-bred dog and his success at stud goes further to prove my point in previous articles that breeding tells, particularly the all-important dam line.

I am very glad to say the Hurdle Sweepstakes in Kilkenny is bringing out some useful novices and the big majority are grand jumpers and with a little experience will be potential grand national entries. Kilkenny Track deserves credit for their splendid effort to revive hurdle racing. During my visit there I only saw one dog inclined to fight and I am told by regular patrons that the fighters are not put into races.

The racing at Waterford on Tuesday night was interesting and included a hurdle. This was won by W. Dower's (Youghal) Our Leader in the good time of 32.10. He is a fast jumper and looks likely to break 32 secs. in his next outing. The fourth race provided another of the good things as the winner, with moderate form on the card, was backed like a certainty, so somebody knew something. I have on several occasions drawn attention to matters of this kind and will go on doing so in an effort to draw making money at the expense of the many.

The attention of readers is drawn to an article in the front page of last week's "Courage Calendar" entitled "Some Defects that might be Reviewed," so, perhaps, my voice will not much longer be a voice in the wilderness.
