Hospital Patients' "Hunger Strike" Protest

SATURDAY SEPTEMBER 25, 1948.

"Food Not Up To Standard" STATEMENT AT BOARD OF ASSISTANCE MEETING.

That male tuberculosis patients in the County Hospital, Waterford, had gone on "hunger strike" recently as a protest against the food given to them, was stated by Mr. T. Kyne in a report of an inspection of the hospital made on July 20, read at the Board of Assistance meeting at Dun.

The Secretary then proceeded to read
it, and it stated that in regard to the complaint made by Mr. Kyne, that in the last week of June, the steam boiler was being prepared for annual inspection; the steam supplied was practically cut off, so that the food was practically cut off and the food was cooked under difficulties, as other apparatus for cooking was altogether inadequate. RATIONING OF BREAD, FLOUR AND WHEATENMEAL. The Minister for Industry and Commerce has made an Order en-itled the Flour and Bread (Rationing) Order, 1946 (Supplemental Provisions) (Harvest Perjod) (Amendment) Order, 1948. The Order provides for the extension by one week of the period during which persons resident outside the County Borough of Dublin, the Borough of Dunlaoghaire, and the County Boroughs of Cork, Limerick and Waterford, may obtain increased rations of bread, flour and wheatenmeal.
