**A FAIR GREEN IS NEEDED**

The holding of the monthly cattle fairs on the principal streets of the town has been the subject of many complaints by and a source of considerable annoyance to the vast majority of our townspeople, and for many years past there has been a growing demand for their removal to a place more suited for the purpose. True, this demand was never organised in public form and never went beyond the expressing of opinion, individually and collectively. We believe, therefore, that if the necessary steps were taken, this demand would receive the support of the majority of the townspeople.

Let us take a glance at the fair day in town, particularly one held on a wet day. The streets are filled with belching cattle and squealing pigs; the roads are covered with filth and mud, resembling more a farmyard than the streets of a town; traffic is obstructed; farmers and cattle-dealers are running here and there, a danger to themselves, to motorists and lorry drivers. It is confusion in excelsis. And through all this the citizens of the town must make their way, often very forcibly, to get to their place of business or employment. Do we people of Dungarvan have always boasted of the well-kept condition of their town, on its cleanliness and its amenities. One wonders what the comments of a visitor to the town on a fair day would be. We suggest that he would agree with us if we said—to put it mildly—that a fair day belied that boast.

Arguments have been put forward that by holding fairs outside the town it would have a detrimental effect on the business of the town. We do not subscribe to that view. We believe that the comparatively short distance to travel, such as a fair green would entail, will not stop a man from carrying out his business.

We are convinced that a fair green is an essential amenity in a progressive town such as ours. In many towns of similar and lesser importance they are provided; and in those towns in which they are not, order-minded citizens are demanding them. And their demands are being met. In fact, recent years have seen this nauseating and disgusting practice of holding fairs on town streets disappearing rapidly from all Irish towns except a few. Why should Dungarvan be amongst the minority?

The refusal of the Council to put the sum for no other reason than to prevent the rates being increased by 4d. in the £ will result in a considerable number of men being forced to live on a weekly subsistence which can only give them a standard of life which is contrary to the social teachings of the Catholic Church in order to earn the wherewithal to support their dependents. Therefore, in order to offset such a tragedy, the meeting calls upon the Chairman of the County Council to summon without delay a meeting of the Council for the purpose of rescinding their previous decision.
