DROWNING TRAGEDY IN DUNGARVAN QUAY

CAPPOQUIN MAN'S TRAGIC END

Verdict of "Accidental

O'Mahony said that if the jury was not satisfied with the evidence the inquest could be adjourned to get the evidence of the driver of the car, but judging from the circumstances.

"is that you give as your verdict that the deceased died from asphyxia due to accidental drowning. There is no evidence that he lost his life by any other way." The Coroner then com-plimented Mr. Coleman and pointed otu that everything possible was done by those who carried out the artificial respiration and by the doctors to rescuscitate the deceased. Supt. O'Mahony said that all those who assisted at the artificial respiration concluded that there was no smell or any indication that this man had any drink. It was only fair to the deceased to say that. The jury then returned a verdict that deceased died from asphyxia due to accidental drowning.

The Coroner expressed his sympathy with the relatives of the deceased, and the foreman of the jury and Supt. O'Mahony joined in the expression of sympathy. Supt. O'Mahony said that the deceased was decent, hard-working man, and it was very unfortunate that this old man, imbued with the spirit of the Gael and following the fortunes of the Waterford team, should come to such an unfortunate and sad end.
