Dungarvan District Court.

The Dungarvan District Court was held on Tuesday, before District Justice E. O. Riain.
TRANSFER OF LICENCES.
Mr. P. J. Morrissey, solicitor (Messrs. Farrell and Morrissey) was on behalf of Miss Margaret Dempsey, 3, Grattan Square, Dungarvan, granted an ad interim transfer of the publican's licence recently held by Mr. Wm. Morrissey.
Miss Dempsey, in evidence, said she purchased the interest in the premises, was in occupation of them, and intended carrying on the business of the licensed premises.
There being no objection on behalf of the Garda authorities, the application was granted.
Mr. P. C. Williams, J. F. Williams (and Son) was, on behalf of Mr. Moe Egan, granted an ad interim transfer of the licence recently held by the applicant's mother, Mrs. Mary Egan, in respect of the licensed premises of Egan's Hotel, Dungarvan.
The applicant gave evidence that the premises had been transferred to him by his mother and he was now carrying on the licensed business.
The application was granted and there was no objection from the Garda authorities.
BREACH OF LICENSING LAWS.
Supt. O'Mahony, Dungarvan, charged Mrs. Mary Egan, Egan's Hotel, Dungarvan, with a breach of the Licensing Laws on Sunday, December 12, 1948. A number of people found on the premises at the time were also summoned.
Mr. T. C. Williams, on behalf of the licensee and the men on the premises, pleaded guilty.
Supt. O'Mahony said that the Garda visited the premises at 9.55 p.m. and found a number of men there.
Replying to the Justice, the Court Clerk stated that the last conviction against the licensee was in 1948 when she was fined £5.
Mr. Williams referred to the fact that the licence had now been transferred from Mrs. Egan to her son, Moe Egan. He admitted that the premises had not been used as a public house since the transfer, but in view of the fact that her son had now taken over the licence, he would ask for the licence to be renewed for six months so as to give Mr. Egan an opportunity to start clean.
Supt. O'Mahony said he had no objection, but he would advise the Court to be more careful about the premises.
The case was adjourned for six months.
ABUSIVE LANGUAGE.
In the adjourned cases of Christopher Power, Ballinroad, against Mrs. A. Prendergast, do, for abusive language and the cross-summons by Mrs. Prendergast against Power for abusive language and assault, Mr. P. J. Morrissey, solicitor (for Power), referred to the charge in evidence that Mrs. Prendergast while she was giving evidence at the last court as regards to her being bound to the peace on one occasion, said she had got a certificate showing that she had been bound to the peace at Lismer Court in 1934.
Mr. J. F. Kenny, solicitor (E. A. Ryan and Co.) said that Mrs. Prendergast stated in the box at the last court that she was not bound to the peace. She obtained a letter from James Power which stated that she was not bound to the peace by him. She was under a misapprehension and thought that Mr. Morrissey was referring specifically to these people in that case.
Mr. Morrissey here handed in the certificate showing she was bound to the peace.
Justice—Have you any evidence to show that she is one and the same person?
Mr. Morrissey—It is admitted that she lived in Lismer at that time.
Mr. Kenny said he was admitting that she was bound to the peace 14 years ago. "I am satisfied," added Mr. Kenny, "that she was under a misapprehension that she thought Mr. Morrissey was referring to James Power."
The Justice said that on evidence he had heard at the last court he would accord to the application to bind her to the peace. The Justice then made an order binding Mrs. Prendergast to the peace for 12 months in her own bond of £10, or £5 in default 14 days in prison. He allowed £1 8s. costs. He dismissed the cross-summons.
OCCASIONAL LICENCE.
Mr. P. J. Morrissey, solicitor, was on behalf of Mr. P. J. Power, granted an occasional licence for the Garda, Dungarvan, on Wednesday, January 19th.
ALLEGED LARCENY OF TIMBER.
An adjournment in the next week was granted in the case in which Palk Neecham, Saddle Street, Abbeyside, is charged with the larceny of timber valued at £15 from Cloncostrane wood.
Mr. P. J. Morrissey, solicitor, for defendant, pleaded not guilty.
CHILDREN'S COURT.
Detective-Guard P. Grogan, summoned 7 school children, ages ranging from 10 to 14 years, from the Mitchell Street area, with playing hurling on the public road at Mitchell Street on December 4 last.
Complainant, after proving the charge, said this was only one of a multitude of complaints that had been received at the Garda Station about hurling on the streets. When a Guard in uniform came along the boys ran away and when the Guard had gone away they started at it again.

I COURSED AND TRACKED

GOOD NEWS FOR IRISH BREEDERS.
WITH the removal of restrictions on English greyhound racing in July the market for greyhounds will experience a very necessary boom. The removal of the present restrictions will mean a full week's racing on English tracks, and very necessary to most of the track kennels will have to bring their string of racers up to full strength. Owing to the present regulations curtailing the number of meetings on weeks only a very limited number of dogs are required. It is hoped that the year 1949 will be a good one for the Irish breeder.
I was very glad to read in the "Coursing Calendar" last week that the new system of ear-marking for puppies is now in force. All honest breeders will welcome this new and very necessary undertaking, and the principal and most important part of it, in my opinion, the rule that litters must be reported for registration within seven days of whelping. This will cut out the autumn whelps that we hear about with January registrations in the following year, and this was quite a well-known practice all over the country. The rule of the fee to £2 for duplicate cards will make it a little more costly for the people who lose their cards before the time when they are required, etc. In fact, where a dog is reported as a bag fighter, his card as far as tracking is concerned should be withdrawn altogether and only a court order permit issued. Everyone interested in track racing knows that the fighter is the greatest menace to the sport, and the duty of every stewards and racing manager is to see that no fighters are allowed to be tried or raced on tracks under their control. During last season I have seen numerous bag fighters put into races on local tracks since after time when the results, and there seem to be no one held responsible. The only solution is to enforce the rule that every track must be searched for fighters. The "Coursing Calendar" with a view to having the dog or dogs listed as fighters in the official organ, and further, to mark them with a red ink, may seem harsh to some owners, but it is necessary if we want good clean racing. I am also suggesting a list of well-known fighters be sent to every track manager where sales are held so as to prevent them being sold as clean runners. Of course, if already suggested this would not be necessary. However, everything will right itself in time, and it is up to every decent owner and breeder to help the Irish Coursing Club to clean up and get the greyhound industry on a solid foundation, so that we can build up more and more into the best in the world and be able to deliver the goods to all our customers, old and new.

WEST WATERFORD G.A.A. CONVENTION

BIG HOSTING OF GAELS AT CLASHMORE.
Clashmore, historic in the annals of the G.A.A., was the venue for the annual Convention of the West Waterford Divisional Board G.A.A. on Sunday last.
Mr. C. Curran (chairman) presided and also present were—Mr. T. A. Kyne (outgoing secretary); Mr. M. V. O'Donoghue, B.E., Chairman County Board, West Waterford; Mr. C. C. President, County Board, N.A.C.A.I.; Rev. Fr. J. Foley, Very Rev. Fr. P. Ahearn, P.P., S.A.; Mr. J. Dower, M.C. There were 51 delegates representing 44 affiliated clubs. Messrs. Jim Ware (Capt.), Eddie Carew, Kevin O'Connor and Josie Murphy (sub.) of the Waterford G.H. team were also in attendance and received a rousing reception from the big gathering.
Very Rev. Fr. Flynn, P.P., Clashmore, extended a cordial welcome to the delegates. He was glad that they selected that historic spot for their annual Convention. He congratulated the Waterford teams on their successes during 1948 and he wished them many more victories during 1949 (loud applause).
SECRETARY'S REPORT.
I submit herewith my report of the workings of the Board for 1948. As the delegates are aware, I have been forced, due to my election to Ballitore in February of last year, to appoint a deputy Secretary to act during the year. Because of this I am not in a position to give as full and detailed a report as I have done in other years. From what I have learned from the examination of the accounts, I find that the propagation of our Gaelic games has continued and prospered. The financial position of the Board continues to be uncertain and this is chiefly due to the drain imposed because of the percentages required to be paid to clubs. I would stress this fact and once again ask that this matter be reconsidered if the Board is to remain solvent and continue its work for the promotion of Gaelic games and ideals. There is a small drop in the number of clubs and teams as compared to last year, but the consolidation of clubs was something desirable and which led to a better competition. The conduct of our players during the year was good except for isolated incidents. It is essential that we play not only Gaelic games but that we play them in a true Irish spirit of sportsmanship and decency.
No report of mine would be complete if I omitted mention of our wonderful minor and senior hurlers who won the All-Ireland Championships in 1948. The West Division can feel justly proud of its representatives on both teams. Our hurling footballers also deserve honourable mention for their great display. As nothing succeeds like success I forecast a wonderful year for Gaelic games in the division in 1949. Divisional honours were won by Cappoquin J.H.; Sarsfields M.H. and M.F. Our J.F. Competition remains unbroken for the first time in ten years. Three teams remain to play off the final. This latter state should serve as a warning against unnecessary rivalries during the coming season.
P. Ryan, acting Secretary of the Board in 1948, has left us to take up employment in England. He was a former chairman of the division for a number of years. The service he has given the Board was of the highest order and his presence on the Board was well deserved. I desire to thank him for his services during the year, and also Declan O'Sullivan, who has taken over since Paddy Ryan has gone. The sympathy of the Board goes to our chairman, Charles Curran, who buried his father some months ago. To him and all other Gaels who have suffered bereavement, I offer my personal sympathy. I desire to thank the officials of the Division and Secretary of the County Board for their assistance now and in the past years. To the Press and Garda I also give my hearty thanks. I wish to inform the Board that I am not contesting the Secretaryship this year as I could not possibly carry out my duties as I would wish. I wish to thank all my old friends of the G.A.A. for all past favours and say I will always remember my period of office with pride and happiness.

He did his work in the same thorough and conscientious manner as he had performed the duties of chairman for three years previously. It was a source of deep regret to us all and a big loss to the Association that Paddy left the district some time ago.
For the past couple of months Seagoin O'Suilleabhain has acted as secretary and has done his work in a very capable manner.
In conclusion, I desire to sincerely thank the officials and members of this Board and the officials and members of the different clubs in the West for their kindness, help and co-operation during the past year.

PREMIUMS TO BULLS 1949

THE County Waterford Committee of Agriculture invite applications from persons intending to compete for Premiums to Bulls under the conditions set forth in the Department's Scheme for encouraging improvement in the breeds of Cattle, 1949, and who are prepared to purchase such animals at any of the Spring Shows or Sales approved by the Department.

In making selection the Committee shall have regard to the needs for securing the location of an adequate number of bulls of the Dairy Short-horn Breed.

Towards this end, the Committee shall allocate at least 2/5ths of the available premiums to Bulls of that Breed, but of the total number of Premium Bulls of all ages to stand in the County for 1949 the proportion of Short-horns, including Dairy Short-horns, must not be less than the corresponding proportion in the year 1948.

The Committee shall if necessary take other special steps as they may deem most effective to secure that at least this proportion of premiums is fully availed of.

Cow-Testing Associations and Co-operative Societies can compete for these Premiums.

Breeds of Bulls eligible for premiums and value of premium: - 1. Pedigree Registered Dairy Short-horn.

(a) Sire and dam registered; milk record of dam and dam of sire not less than 8,500 lb., and butter-fat record of each not less than 300 lbs. - £40.

(b) Sire and dam registered; milk record of dam and dam of sire not less than 7,500 lb., and butter-fat record of each not less than 260 lbs. - £30.

(c) Sire and dam registered; not less than 300 lbs. - £24.

2. Non-pedigree Registered Dairy Short-horn: (a) Milk record of dam and dam of sire not less than 8,500 lb., and butter-fat record of each not less than 300 lbs. - £24.

(b) Milk record of dam and dam of sire not less than 7,500 lb., and butter-fat record of each not less than 260 lbs. - £16.

(c) Not qualified for category (a) or category (b) - £15.

3. Aberdeen Angus - £15. 4. Hereford - £15. Each applicant for a Premium Bull must lodge a deposit of £2 with application. No application will be considered unless accompanied by a deposit. The deposit will be returned to each purchaser of a Premium Bull.

Applications, on Forms which will be supplied for the purpose, must be duly filled up and returned not later than 28th January, 1949. Any application submitted after this closing date will not, in any circumstances, be considered.
